The Word's Return

Today's readings, like last week's, ask us to meditate on Israel's response to God's Word—and our own. Why do some hear the word of the kingdom, yet fail to accept it as a call to conversion and faith in Jesus? That question underlies today's Gospel, especially.

Again we see, as we did last week, that the kingdom's mysteries are unfolded to those who open their hearts, making of them a rich soil in which the Word can grow and bear fruit. As we sing in today's Psalm, in Jesus, God's Word has visited our land, to water the stony earth of our hearts with the living waters of the Spirit.

The first fruit of the Word is the Spirit of love and adoption poured into our hearts in Baptism, making us children of God, as Paul reminds us in today's Epistle from Romans, we are made a "new creation" the first fruits of a new heaven and a new earth.

Since the first humans rejected God's Word, creation has been enslaved to futility (see <u>Genesis 3:17-19</u>; <u>5:29</u>). But God's Word does not go forth only to return to Him void, as we hear in today's First Reading.

His Word awaits our response. We must show ourselves to be children of that Word. We must allow that Word to accomplish God's will in our lives. As Jesus warns today, we must take care lest the devil steal it away or lest it be choked by worldly concerns. In the Eucharist, the Word gives Himself to us as bread to eat. He does so that we might be made fertile, yielding fruits of holiness. And we await the crowning of the year, the great harvest of the Lord's Day —when His Word will have achieved the end for which it was sent.

FRIDAY PENANCE

I wonder if I asked you a question about how you keep Friday as a day of Penance, what would be your answer? In the past we use to eat fish on a Friday, instead of meat, to make an act reparation, in remembrance of Jesus' suffering and death; while Sunday is a day when we remember the resurrection. The Bishops of England and Wales this week have re-established the practice of Friday penance in the lives of the faithful as a clear and distinct mark of their own

Catholic identity. This act of common witness came into effect this Friday, 16 September 2011.

But why are we obliged to practice penitence on Fridays? From the earliest centuries of the Church's history, Friday was dedicated to the memory of the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus Christ, as a day we should make a special effort to practice penitence.

Does this mean that we should eat fish on Fridays? There is no requirement for us to eat fish instead of meat on Friday. Our act of abstinence does not mean that we have to eat another particular type of food as the regular substitute for meat on a Friday. The precise goal of penitence is not necessarily the avoidance of meat or its substitution with another food but relating the external and common act of penance we do to inner conversion, prayer and works of charity.

Are the bishops placing a greater obligation on Catholics in England and Wales? The only change is that the Bishops have determined that the requirement by all the faithful to do penance on a Friday would be fulfilled by abstaining from meat. Of course, if you are a vegetarian, then you may find another way to fulfil Friday penance. Maybe no 'death by chocolate' desert on a Friday would be adequate! The most important thing is entering into the spirit of Friday penance. It is more a question of intending to accompany Jesus on his way of the cross by small gestures.

In all of this we need to use our common sense, Fr Denis
