A REFLECTION ON THE SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

G od created us out of love and calls us to love in return. This is the most basic calling of every human being. One of the ways that people live that call to love is by getting married. The Church believes that the intimate sharing of life and love that many married couples enjoy is a gift from God. It is part of what God intends for many people.

By 'marriage' the Church means the exclusive, mutual and permanent commitment of a man and a woman to each other to share the whole of their lives together. For the Church the aims of marriage are firstly, the happiness and well-being of the couple and secondly, having children and bringing them up. A couple may not be blessed with children but their love enriches the lives of those around them. The Church teaches that marriage is for life and unconditional. In the Church's understanding of marriage, there is no "maybe" or "for the time being" or "as long as you don't". It is "for better or worse, for richer or poorer, in sickness and in health, until death".

Marriage between two baptised Christians has a special significance for the Church. Christ, by becoming one of us and by his death on the cross, established a new and everlasting covenant between us and God. When two Christians give themselves to each other in marriage, they too establish a covenant or bond between themselves. The Church teaches that this bond is not only a sign of Christ's self-gift —

It is a sacrament of that love. In other words, it makes Christ's love present here and now in a concrete way. It is Christ who raises marriage between the baptised to the dignity of a sacrament. While it is the couple who establish the bond, it is Christ who makes it a sacrament between the baptised.

During the marriage ceremony the priest's task is to receive the vows. It is the couple who establish the bond when they both give consent. Marriage is always a public matter and this is why the consent should be given before witnesses. For a Catholic, it should also be before the Church's priest because just as the other sacraments are part of the life of the Church, so too is marriage. If a Catholic gets married in a registry office the marriage is not valid in the eyes of the Church. The Church allows Catholics to marry non-Catholics in Church, even if the non-Catholic is not baptised. However, the non-Catholic must be supportive of the Catholic's commitment to the faith.

Consent to marriage can only be given freely. There is no marriage if one of the parties does not readily give their consent. For example someone might be married already, or a person might be forced to go through with a marriage out of fear or guilt. If it can be shown that there wasn't proper and mutual consent at the time of the marriage. the Church can declare that in fact the marriage was never valid. We call this an annulment. This is different from civil divorce, where the state dissolves a marriage that it recognised as valid up until that point. The Church does accept that sometimes the best thing is that a couple separate. Living in a bad marriage can be extremely damaging. In fact, it can become almost a countersign to Christ's love. Sadly, many marriages which have failed can still be valid in the eves of the church. For such couples civil divorce may be the most prudent option, but because the bond they established between them is still there, neither party is free to marry someone else. Contrary to popular opinion, a divorced Catholic who has not remarried can receive communion.

The difficulty arises if that person wants to remarry. We began this article by saying that our fundamental calling is to love, but it is important to add that love is never easy, and in fact sometimes it goes wrong. Some people will read this and feel that the Church's standards are so high as to exclude them in their particular situation. Many Catholics have lived through the heart-break of a broken marriage or indeed the pain of a bad marriage.

I have had the privilege of listening to the stories of parishioners. In some cases, it has turned out that the situation wasn't as hopeless as they first thought. However, whether or not something could be done, I hope that we have been able to support each other in our God-given vocation to Christian love. if this article provokes some thoughts please do feel free to come and talk to me.
