As the people were in expectation, and all men questioned in their hearts concerning John, whether perhaps he were the Christ, John answered them all, "I baptise you with water; but he who is mightier than I is coming, the thong of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and with fire."

We hear this Gaudate Sunday that large numbers of people came out to hear the "good news" proclaimed by John the Baptist. John's task was to wake up the people of his day from spiritual sleep and indifference, and to turn them back to hear God's voice and obey his commandments. John wanted the people to be in a good place to receive the Messiah and follow him.

Whenever the Gospel is proclaimed it has the power to awaken faith in us who will listen and turn to God. God, in turn, is always ready to open our eyes to the spiritual reality of his kingdom and to the power and action of the Holy Spirit who transforms us into the likeness of Christ. Do you believe that God's word is "good news" for you? And do. During this Third week of Advent let us allow his word to take root and grow in us, and to bring us the fruit of joy, freedom, and new life in the Holy Spirit.

John's baptism was for repentance - turning away from sin and taking on a new way of life. John said that the Messiah would "baptise with the Holy Spirit and with fire." Fire in biblical times was associated with God and with his action in the world and in the lives of his people. God sometimes manifested his presence by use of fire, such as the burning bush which was not consumed when God spoke to Moses (Exodus 3:2). The image of fire was also used to symbolise God's glory (Ezekiel 1:4, 13), his protective presence (2 Kings 6:17), his holiness (Deuteronomy. 4:24), his righteous judgment (Zechariah 13:9), and his wrath against sin (Isaiah 66:15-16). In the New Testament, the image of fire is also used of the Holy Spirit who comes to cleanse us from sin and make us holy. God's fire both purifies us of sin and it inspires in us a reverent fear of God and of his word. And it increases our desire for holiness and for the joy of meeting the Lord when he comes again.
