

But Jesus said, "You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us.








THE WORD

Year B • Psalter Week 2

Today's Gospel reading first presents us with two examples of Jesus' attitude towards people who do not belong to the circle of his disciples.

We might describe Jesus as being positively tolerant of the exorcist who was using his name, and therefore his power, to cast out devils without being authorised beforehand. We might note that the person concerned was actually able to perform this act of power; the name of Jesus was sufficient to bring about the desired result. The disciples, however, take a different view: the person has no business using the name of Jesus as he is "not one of us". They are jealous of their own privileges and try to stop him. The detail that the exorcist was actually successful does not seem to matter to them at all, despite the fact that they themselves had been unable to perform a similar feat a short time before.

The second case, that of strangers who are kind to the disciples "in the name of Christ", echoes the earlier teaching about welcoming Christ in the little child who represents the social "nobodies".

The final section is concerned with discipleship. Anyone who puts a block in front of a simple believer and causes them to fall away or into sin is condemned in the strongest terms. The "little ones" are those genuine but vulnerable members of the community. The sayings about cutting off parts of the body which lead disciples into sin are examples of the exaggeration customarily used at the time to emphasise the gravity of a situation and are not to be taken literally. However, we find the image of the body used elsewhere to represent the Christian (and civil) community, so cutting off the offending members of the physical body may also mean dealing severely with people who harm the body of believers by excommunicating them – as a last resort, of course.

LEARN

"Hell" (or Gehenna) originally referred to the Hinnon Valley which ran south and west of Jerusalem; it was later condemned by the prophet Jeremiah as a place of pagan worship.

Gehenna later was used as a rubbish dump where fires perpetually burned: it was the "Smokey Mountain" of its day.

The idea of hell belongs to apocalyptic writing, which is concerned with the end of the world and divine judgement. It represents, in symbolic terms, the opposite of eternal life with God.

SAY

They are my Christian sisters and brothers.

DO

As you travel around, notice the various churches. Think positively about the faith and commitment of the people who worship there, and pray for them.

REFLECT

ne of the most positive religious developments of the second half of the 20th century was the growth of the ecumenical movement. Christian bodies which had viewed each other with suspicion and hostility began cautiously to talk to one another and discover what they had in common rather than what divided them. One

of the most significant and dramatic gestures in this area came from Pope Paul VI. In 1966 there occurred the first official visit by an Archbishop of Canterbury since 1397 in the person of Dr Michael Ramsey. While archbishop of Milan, Pope Paul had taken trouble to learn about the Anglican Church which he later called "our beloved"

sister". After the final service at the Basilica of St Paul Outside-The-Walls, the pope took off the ring he had worn as archbishop and put it on Dr Ramsey's finger. Jesus said that no one who performs a work in his name is likely to speak ill of him. Maybe that is a lesson on which we might all reflect.
