

GOSPEL Matthew 2:1-12

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. "Where is the infant king of the Jews"? they asked. "We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. "At Bethlehem in Judaea," they told him "for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah,

for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. "Go and find out all about the child," he said "and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage." Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and

halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

Matthew is a Jewish Christian writing for a community which included many people from a Jewish background.

So to this evangelist it is natural to show that in the person of Jesus, God's plan for human beings, as revealed in the Hebrew scriptures, has been fulfilled. His audience, steeped in the traditions of their religion, would understand the background against which he is writing and the allusions he is making to their folklore and practices.

The biblical background to Matthew's presentation of the Good News is that of the Exodus, the event which defines the Jewish people and their understanding of God. The human figure dominating the narrative is Moses, the person who puts into action God's plan for the liberation of the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt and who brings God's Law, or teaching, to the Israelites at Sinai. Matthew casts Jesus as a present-day Moses: his Infancy Narrative has many echoes of the story of Moses and of the Exodus experience. Hence, the tragic episode of the massacre of the male children in and around Bethlehem (for which there is no evidence outside of the account of Matthew) echoes the reaction of the Egyptian Pharaoh to a perceived threat to his throne and power.

So when we consider the exotic visitors from the east, the magi, and the star which leads them to Jerusalem and then to Bethlehem, we would do well to look for clues in the Exodus story. One possibility is the figure of Balaam, described by a Greek-speaking Jewish writer called Philo as a *magos*.

He is a person accredited with supernatural insight, who is brought by King Balak to curse the people of Israel and so bring disaster upon them. Balaam, instead, pronounces a blessing, so causes the opposite effect. He prophesies that "a star shall come forth from Jacob, and a sceptre arise out of Israel" (Numbers 24:17). The star in Matthew shines over the land of Israel (Jacob) and announces the birth of the King of the Jews (the sceptre). Herod intends to use the magi to destroy Jesus, whom he regards as a threat to his tenuous claim to be a king, but they thwart his plans by not returning with the information he needs, as a result of a supernatural warning. Matthew thus sets the scene for his narrative of the ministry and passion of Jesus. Jesus is a figure like Moses, but even greater, and will fulfil God's plan for another Exodus for those who accept his message.

REFLECT

here have been many learned articles written about the star of Bethlehem, its identity and the time of its appearing. However, the Gospel writers often use symbolic writing to convey their belief about the person of Jesus. Matthew, then, is drawing on stories familiar to his audience and

expects them to make the connections. Many Christians have little acquaintance with the Jewish scriptures and so fail to appreciate the links being made. The answer to "What was the star of Bethlehem?" is probably to be found in the book of Numbers, rather than in astronomical speculation.

SAY

All nations shall worship you, Lord.

DO

Read the first two chapters of the Gospel according to Matthew. Look up the cross references to the book of Exodus and note the connections.



LEARN

Midrash is a type of writing which takes a familiar biblical story and reinterprets it.

Some scholars regard Matthew's Infancy Narrative as a *midrash* on the story of Moses and the Exodus.

The magi are Gentiles with knowledge from the natural sciences; they need the Jewish scriptures to complete their search.

Matthew mentions three gifts, not three kings.
