That means we will be able to manage with just the one priest being here. We are sorry to have to do this but it is a sign of the times. We very much hope that parishioners at Holy Cross and Most Holy Redeemer will make an effort to offer lifts particularly to older parishioners so that they can get to Mass at St Joseph's, or Old Harlow or Puckeridge.

#### Fr Peter writes:



In 1914 Mgr Robert Hugh Benson died at the age of 43 and left his house and land at Hare Street, Hertfordshire, to the Archbishops of Westminster as a country retreat for their use. Fr Benson was a convert from the Church of England, (his father was Archbishop of Canterbury). He was a prolific writer and much in demand as a preacher.

At Hare Street he had fitted out a small outbuilding as a Chapel and he and his friends had made an altar and carved figures including one of Our Blessed Lady stamping her foot on the heresies of the Church. After his death a chapel was specially built over his grave in the orchard of the house and this altar and statue were placed in a Lady Chapel attached to it. With the current sale of the property the Cardinal has asked us to find a home for the altar and statue at St Joseph's. They have been carefully conserved and have now been placed in the bay where the statue of St Gerard Magella was. (Being a saint special to children his statue has been moved to the Baptistery where a new shrine is to be created.)

The Cardinal is very grateful to us for finding a home for this unique survival of Mgr Benson and his circle.



# Sunday W Message

THE WORD

Year C • Psalter Week 2



This is the year of Luke's Gospel and you may have noticed over the past number of weeks the amount of times Jesus is questioned by an inquisitive crowd of followers. He takes on the role of rabbi or teacher today and is asked about the apportioning of inheritance between two brothers.

The law of the time dictated that the eldest son must receive twice as much as each of the other children upon the death of their father. However, there seems to be a dispute today in which Jesus is asked to comment. Cleverly he sidesteps the issue and focuses on the heart of the problem, which is our attachment to money, possessions and wealth. Note a parallel theme in today's first reading from Ecclesiastes where the opening line is, "Vanity of vanities. All is vanity." In some Bible translations this sentence reads, "All is meaningless." The book of Ecclesiastes is renowned for its negative, downbeat tone and has quite a pessimistic view on life. The writer is a man who has seen it all and today's question is quite profound in many ways. What's the point in toiling all your life to amass possessions and wealth when you're just going to leave it all behind anyway? So Jesus uses the parable of the rich landowner who builds bigger barns to store his vast quantities of grain. When all the produce is gathered, the landowner plans a little retirement where he will eat, drink and take life easy. God speaks to the landowner and calls him a fool. On this very night the man will die, and who will own his property then? Through this parable, Jesus mocks the man who relies on possessions to make him happy.

#### SAY

"He is generous even to exhaustion; and what is most wonderful is, that he gives himself thus entirely, not once only, but every day, if we wish it. Every fresh communion is a new gift which Jesus Christ makes of himself."

#### DO

The next time you attend Mass, concentrate more fully on the word of God (first reading, psalm, second reading and Gospel). Allow the words to affect you and take one message home with you, something that will help you in your relationship with God.



#### REFLECT

ecently, a couple from the north of Ireland won a substantial amount of money in the EuroMillions lottery and before TV cameras and reporters from around the world, they explained how their lives would certainly change dramatically but ultimately their needs were few. For some moments, I put myself into their shoes and wondered what it would be like to have over £100

million in my bank account. Perhaps we all do the same from time to time. We like to dream big about the possible car or house or holidays we would have if we won the lotto. Some would say that it's even natural to think in this way because most of our lives are driven by our need to earn money, to buy food and the things that make us and our families comfortable. Keeping this in mind, you might disagree with the strategy of Jesus in calling today's landowner a fool.

These are strong words and for anyone who is wealthy or lives a comfortable life, the Gospel of today is not criticising you for what you have. What Jesus is calling into question is a consumerist mentality where the only focus for people is money and possessions. Jesus points to the people who think there is security in possessions. For Jesus, true wealth, security and happiness is to be found in our relationship with God.
