When some were talking about the Temple, remarking how it was adorned with fine stonework and votive offerings, Jesus said, "All these things you are staring at now – the time will come when not a single stone will be left on another: everything will be destroyed." And they put to him this question: "Master," they said "when will this happen, then, and what sign will there be that this is about to take place?"

"Take care not to be deceived," he said "because many will come using my name and saying, 'I am he' and, 'The time is near at hand.' Refuse to join them. And when you hear of wars and revolutions, do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen but the end is not so soon." Then he said to them, "Nation will fight against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven.

"But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name – and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all on account of my name, but not a hair of

your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives."

THE WORD

Year C . Psalter Week 1

Luke has presented Jesus throughout the Gospel as a prophet. When he reports Jesus as teaching his disciples within the Temple precincts, we might think of the prophet Jeremiah, who found himself in a very vulnerable situation when he preached against the complacency of the people of Jerusalem and their disregard for their responsibilities under the covenant.

This had come about because of their belief that the Lord would never allow the Temple to fall into enemy hands: it did, and Jeremiah's prophetic word was vindicated. Jesus makes a similar prediction, then he goes on to talk about the events which will befall the people of Jerusalem before this takes place. The leaders of the people have rejected the Lord's prophet: now they themselves will be rejected.

Jesus is also speaking about the sufferings and trials of his disciples before the disaster takes place. The clash between the Jewish Christians and the Synagogue will result in persecution, but they should regard being hauled into court as an opportunity to bear witness to what they believe: when this happens, the risen Jesus will inspire them, so they should not rehearse what they will say in their defence. The divisions within families over whether Jesus is the Messiah will lead to disciples being denounced to the authorities by their relatives, but Jesus urges them to stand fast, saying, "Your endurance will win you your lives." They can trust the prophetic word of Jesus: the reader of the Gospel knows that it came true in regard to the Temple; they can rely on it where their own future is concerned.

LEARN

The Temple of Solomon was destroyed by the Babylonians in 587 BC, during the lifetime of the prophet Jeremiah.

The Temple begun by Herod the Great was destroyed by the Romans in AD 70: it was never rebuilt.

With the destruction of the Temple, the Sadducees lost their power base and authority: the leadership of the nation passed to the synagogue and the Pharisees, who became known as the rabbis.

SAY

Let the sea and all within it, thunder! (Psalm 97:7)

DO

The book of Genesis tells us that human beings are to look after and respect the garden, which represents the whole natural environment. See what you can do to put this responsibility into practice.



REFLECT

de are drawing near to the end of the Church's year, and it is customary for the Gospel readings to be rather sombre, reflecting on the end of time. The theme is usually that of disasters on an apocalyptic scale. The focus for this teaching of Jesus is indeed normally the end of the world, but Luke has a different point of view. He places these events within human history: by the time he is writing his Gospel, these catastrophes have already happened, but

they will be repeated down through the ages. People will be persecuted for their beliefs: families will be divided, and there will be war and natural disasters.

In recent years, these calamities in our environment have become alarmingly frequent, due to what we term climate change. Insurance companies used to classify such occurrences as "acts of God": we know now that God is not responsible, it is the fault of human

beings who do not respect the natural world, seeing it only as a resource to be exploited and plundered, with no responsibility to repair the damage done to the fabric of our planet. In this sense, we are bringing disaster upon ourselves, and, as usual, it is the poorest and most vulnerable people who are bearing the brunt. Perhaps a mild dose of panic about the state of the world might be in order.
