

THE WORD

Year C • Psalter Week 2



Today's Gospel passage puts before us what it means for Jesus to be the "King of the Jews". He is on the cross.

But even now, we see that important themes which have run through Luke's narrative continue. There is division among the people over Jesus: he is mocked by the soldiers while the faithful people stand watching. The soldiers and the notice above him on the cross proclaim him sarcastically as "King of the Jews", but ironically, they are correct. The soldiers challenge him, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself," which reminds us of the devil's provocative testing, "If you are the Son of God...": will Jesus be truly the King of the Jews, truly the Son of God, or will he try to avoid his destiny? The two criminals also reflect the division over the person of Jesus: one repeats the taunt of the soldiers and includes himself in the possible deliverance, whereas the other accepts his responsibility for his fate and expresses his faith in Jesus. It is this appeal for mercy which enables him to be forgiven, and he is promised paradise. In Luke's Gospel, salvation means the restoring of the people by the forgiveness of sins. Here on the cross, Jesus still offers forgiveness, even to those who were crucifying him. His death is a perfect summary of his life. If he is a king, it is certainly not in the normal understanding of the title.

REFLECT

any people say that the third Gospel, the version according to Luke, is the one they find most attractive and meaningful of the three Synoptic narratives. Jesus emerges from those pages especially as a sensitive person who is attentive to the needs of those whom he encounters. His exchange with the criminal on the cross is a moving conversation, which reveals his ongoing concern for those individuals who feel themselves rejected and marginalised by mainstream society.

The feast of Christ the King was introduced by Pope Pius XI in 1925. Its full title is "The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe". Christ is presented as having universal authority from God the Father, as St

Paul tells us. This is not a triumphalist notion, but emphasises the mutual relationship of all human beings, that we are all brothers and sisters in God's family. Christ's rule is not envisaged simply as being directed at people, but also over the universe: human beings are the stewards of creation, of the natural world, and as such should treat what is in their care as the Lord intends.

Luke's Christ the King, whom we are celebrating today, is one who gives his life for others: who even as he is dying, still reaches out with forgiveness. Perhaps if we take the lesson of today's Gospel and try to show by our own lives that we accept Jesus' teaching, then the kingdom may well come on earth, as it is in heaven.

SAY

Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom (Luke 23:42)

LEARN

The persons crucified with Jesus were criminals, not thieves.

Death by crucifixion came through the person suffocating because they could no longer push themselves up by their legs and so could not breathe, due to the pressure on their chest.

Jesus was crucified on a political charge as King of the Jews, not for a religious offence, such as claiming to be Son of God.

DO

Look at a crucifix which depicts Jesus as king: it is the cross which shows what Jesus being a king really means.
