GAUDETE SUNDAY – is the third Sunday of Advent in the Roman Catholic calendar of the Church year. The term is derived from the Latin opening words of the introit antiphon, "Rejoice (Gaudete) in the Lord always." The theme of the day expresses the joy of anticipation at the approach of the coming of Our Lord at Christmas, reflecting a lightening of the tone of the traditional Advent observance. This is why the Celebrant of the Mass can choose to wear rosecoloured vestments on this day instead of the deeper violet vestments typically worn during Advent. This Sunday was also known as "Rose Sunday" and that is why we also have a pink or rose-coloured candle among the four candles in our Advent wreath.








THE WORD

Year A . Psalter Week 3



In today's Gospel, we learn that John the Baptist has been thrown into prison. He has heard about Jesus' activities and wonders if Jesus is the one who is to come.

Matthew presents Jesus as offering evidence that he is the Messiah (the Christ) through his works of power in healing. These show God's power breaking through into human life, where that life is impaired or endangered, and this is the coming of the kingdom. Not everyone will accept the evidence of their own eyes and Jesus will be rejected by many members of the religious establishment and of his own family, and he pronounces a blessing on those who do not lose faith.

John is in prison probably because he was attracting key figures in the service of Herod Antipas, the ruler of Judaea, such as soldiers and tax officials: Herod would perceive him as becoming a rival focus of influence and hence a threat to his authority and rule. Some people would see the Messiah as a political/military figure who would provide precisely such leadership: Matthew shows that Jesus as the Christ would not conform to such worldly expectations, hence the list of healings which he gives as signs that the kingdom of God has arrived.

However important John the Baptist may have been, his era is now over, and the least in the kingdom is greater than he is. He is, in a sense, the last of the prophets, one who remains steadfast to his beliefs and the ultimate witness, and it is for that reason that the Church honours him as a saint in the Christian tradition for his part in the Gospel story of Jesus.

DO

Consider celebrating the sacrament of reconciliation as part of your preparation for the feast of Our Lord's Nativity.



LEARN

Christ is a Greek term meaning anointed.

Messiah is a Hebrew term meaning anointed.

In popular thought, the Messiah would be a military hero who would liberate the people of Israel from Roman rule.

REFLECT

here seem to have been differing ideas as to what kind of person the Messiah would be. Today's Gospel presents Jesus as revealing the presence of the kingdom of God through healing and the proclaiming of the Good News. This is the mission which he will entrust to the disciples later in the parrative.

The miracle stories in the Gospel illustrate the kingdom breaking into human life. The mission to proclaim God's love and concern for human beings did not end with the immediate disciples of Jesus but has been given to his disciples down through the ages. We, the members of the Church, are called upon to be missionary disciples wherever we find ourselves. It is perhaps easy to see the Church as a fortress under siege; but the picture of the kingdom is rather one of going on the offensive, of attacking those situations where people are suffering, whether it be through sickness, injustice or prejudice, anywhere that human life is less than it should be. Maybe we should think of being redeemed or saved in a wider context than individual, personal sin: the Bible thinks in terms of being a member of a group, the people of Israel or one of the disciples of Jesus. Being a disciple of Jesus brings responsibilities towards our brothers and sisters.

SAY

The least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than John the Baptist.
