Today is Palm Sunday, next Sunday is Easter Sunday!
During our Lenten journey, like any other journey, we can catch some 'diseases' and stumble over some 'malfunctioning' modes.

Over the past weeks we tried to draw up a catalogue, a list of probable 'Lenten diseases'. An 'Abstract Lent' where Spirit and flesh never seem to come into contact, where the reality of our life remains untouched by the Holy Spirit. A 'Formal Lent' made of diligent external Lenten observances but which does not go deep enough to produce within us a real change of heart. An 'Orphan Lent' struggling to find its place in the womb of the Paschal Baptismal font, our Mother. A Lent in miniature, a 'Half Lent' with a set expiry date, limited to 40 days, nothing more than a parenthesis in our Christian journey. A 'Performance-Oriented Lent' where regrets, apologies and expectations do not allow us to reap the spiritual fruits coming out of the experience of our weakness, limitations, temptations and falls.

So, if these are the 'diseases' of Lent, what makes a healthy Lent? One, and one alone, is the meaning of Lent, the point of meditating over the humiliation, the passion, suffering and death of Christ: the announcement of the GREAT LOVE of God for us.

Why did the Word of God take on a human body? Why did He humble himself so much? Why did he stretch out that holy body on the cross? Why? God did all of this for no other reason than to make known to the world his love, so that we could 'fall prisoners' of that same love and so love in return out of that great love. Lent is about Love: the great Love of God becoming the cause of our love.

The passion and death of our Lord Jesus Christ is not in order ro save us from our sins alone, and not for any other reason but only so that the world may meet the Love of God.

Oh Lent... Oh Holy Lent... you are the mirror of the Great Love of God for the world.
