

Known for his confessional and spiritual guidance. Prayerful and austere. Loved the Mass and Our lady. Lived a life of intense suffering and constant apostolic activity in San Giovanni Rotondo. Canonised 16th June 2002 by Pope John Paul II

<u>Friday 24th</u> Our Lady of Walsingham. England's Nazareth. Goes back to Saxon times. Built originally as a replica of Nazareth and the Annunciation to Mary. One of the foremost shrines of Medieval Christendom. Destroyed during Reformation. Long period of restoration. First Mass since the Reformation offered there on 15th August 1934. Became the national shrine of Our Lady.

Saturday 18th Feria. Blessed Virgin Mary

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time 2021 Children of the Kingdom

This weekend marks the celebration of First Holy Communion in the parish. The timing is of course unusual, thanks to Covid which has had such an impact on every facet of life. Jesus clearly loved children and this weekend is certainly about them. We see in the Gospel how Jesus uses the example of children to portray what he himself and the Kingdom are all about.

The adult disciples that Jesus encounters have their own agenda. They are concerned about which one of them will be the greatest in the new dispensation of things. Rather than giving them a piece of his mind Jesus places before them a little child, a symbol of innocence and purity, without status or power. This is what the Kingdom is about and it invites all those who share the attributes of a child to become its members. It is clear then why Jesus tended to associate more with the lowly people he came across in his life. They in fact become his people.

Children tend to be open and often have the ability to ask difficult questions. After hearing the clearly difficult teaching regarding Jesus' own death and resurrection the disciples are afraid to ask any more. What the child may tend to ask the disciples do not. For them it's much easier to discuss status and prestige.

To truly learn from Jesus, the great teacher, we must become like the little child in the Gospel. It means casting aside our own concerns and being open to a new reality. Our Christian belief is centred on the Paschal Mystery, which means the passion, death and resurrection of the Lord. Adopting the poise of a child it involves being open and humble in the face of this great mystery. We are led not towards considerations of greatness but to faith, love and commitment. We are taught not just about dying but about life itself and where it ultimately leads to. As St.Augustine said "faith is to believe what you do not yet see; the reward for this faith is to see what you believe." *Fr.John*
