The Pope's Monthly Intention for July. For a Eucharistic life. We pray that Catholics may place the celebration of the Eucharist at the heart of their lives, transforming human relationships in a very deep way and opening to an encounter with God and all their brothers and sisters.

Gospel Notes. Jesus uses parables to make people think about their own responses to his message. With today's parable you may recognise that at different times you have been like each of the different types of soil.

The parable is also an invitation to us to ask ourselves why is it that there are times when we are unreceptive to a truth presented to us either in the word of God or in the words of another.

Parents with children, teachers with pupils, speakers with listeners, are like sowers in a field where the preparation of the soil is up to another- the child, pupil or listener. They can sow the seed but cannot guarantee that it will bear fruit. At times there may be a temptation not to try any more. The challenge is to sow in hope. When have you been surprised by the harvest you have reaped?

Thought for the Day. Joy and happiness are two different things, although they are obviously related. There are things in our live we feel happy doing or experiencing. Watching a good movie makes us feel happy for the time we're watching it. Happiness is very much in the moment and it can be good. But joy is a different thing. Joy is a deeper dense than happiness. We feel happy watching a film but we feel joy when we see a good friend who we haven't seen for a while. To live lives of joy is not to depend on happiness or temporary experiences. It is to seek out the better path and walk it.
