1st Sunday of Advent is in some ways the low point of the liturgical year. We hear about the disasters which are to befall the human race, which Luke portrays most starkly: “men dying of fear as they await what menaces the world.” Of course, we will all face our own individual apocalypse, well before these things ‘begin to take place’; as the poor people killed in the Shoreham air crash, or the 760 or so victims of the Hajj stampede in September; or the 129 killed by terrorists in Paris. But, when the whole human race has to face it together it will be much more terrifying because we will see it coming. We cannot say, though, that this will be because of human agency - we may do our best to degrade the natural environment but it would be arrogant to imagine we are strong enough to destroy the universe. It will come to an end, but in God’s good time, and in a manner of God’s choosing: possibly not even violent - Paul does not have the dire predictions of Luke, who had lived through the destruction of the Temple in AD 70. In the meantime, expect it any day; but stay awake, love one another and live blameless lives.
