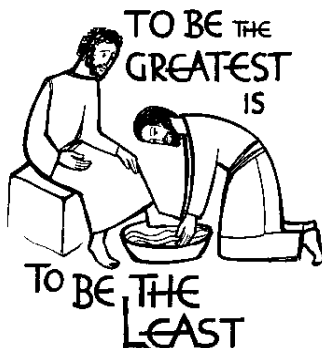

A variety of lessons to learn today. The first couple of verses of the Gospel are the reason for the story of Eldad and Medad from Numbers. The vaguely comic names ensure they are easy to remember, as the people who spoke up for God without an official warrant, and arouse indignation in others who think it is their job. This could happen today - we should think of examples. The Psalm is the familiar one about the happiness brought by obeying God's commandments; we might think of 'law' as dry and oppressive, so this is a viewpoint we have to get used to. It goes with the second half of the Gospel, which starts off by commending someone who gives you a cup of water because you bear the name of Christ (the connection with the first story), and then saying what will happen to people who do the opposite. This again leads into a series of drastic ways of avoiding hell fire Tabloid papers condemn people to hell more readily than Christians nowadays - why should this be?
