Today we hear in the gospel that, *“Jesus went about from one town to the other doing good.”* We were not told that he healed only the poor or the rich. Rather, he allowed his blessings to reach the poor as well as the rich, the good as well as the bad. Jesus did not discriminate or show favouritism. Instead, he identified with all classes of people. Christ associated and ate with tax collector and sinners. He healed the daughter of Jairus, the Roman centurion who was both wealthy and a gentile. He spoke with, and restored the life and faith of a Samaritan woman, who was thought to be in serious sin. Among his apostles was Levi, a very rich tax collector who today is a saint of the Church. On the other hand, he healed many poor blind, lame, deaf and dumb people. *“He did all things well”* without showing favouritism, or minding the race, background or status of those he healed.

It’s a high standard that Jesus sets before us, to imitate him by aiming at doing good to all, caring for the wounded, helping others in need without favouritism or, minding their status. The example of Jesus calls us to be different, by being outstanding in generosity and goodness, rather than in favouritism. God’s desire is to heal us and our world. As his instruments, we can imitate the generosity of Christ his Son. We can go about doing good and reaching out to those in need irrespective of who they are, their standing, and class in life.
