Walk with me

A scripture and prayer journey through Eastertide are available at the back of Church for £1 ...and I will be your God Gen. 17.9

It is all about Covenant. God and us. We can't really understand the Bible without Covenant. God made his Covenant with Abraham. The Covenant is a blood bond.

The terms are always "I will be your God and you will be my people", and he promised many descendants to Abraham.

It is this Covenant that the Jews, confronting the Lord Jesus, claim as justifying them. They were born into it. It was kept going by sacrifices in the Temple. It was a Covenant based on the faith of Abraham. Jesus in confronting the Jews tell them that if they were true descendants of Abraham who lived by and with his faith and not by claims of a blood line they would recognise him as being the God of Abraham. As it is, they follow their own father.

"Before Abraham ever was, I am." He was before Abraham. He, the eternal Word, existed before Abraham. "I am" is the name God gave to Moses at the burning bush. Say to Pharaoh "I am" has sent me to you. "I am" – I am existence itself, the one without whom nothing would or can exist. They take this as blasphemy unable to perceive the presence of God in Jesus.

Ours is the New Covenant, not a Covenant that is kept going by animal sacrifice – praise be. No longer animal substitutes sacrificed as a holocaust for the sins of people; no longer blood sprinkled over the people on the day of Atonement. We can all be grateful for that.

The New Covenant has been sealed once and for all with the blood of the perfect sacrifice of the Lord Jesus who offered himself and ended the Temple sacrifices. And his is a Covenant that lasts for ever. Immortal – it will never die away.

He has made this Covenant in his own blood.

It is not the covenant of a blood line. You don't have to be born into it physically.

You are born into it spiritually through baptism. How we will rejoice at the Easter Vigil with Nima, Deborah, Sam and Rachel who will be baptised into this Covenant. Katharine who is already a baptised Catholic will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. With us they enter into the Covenant between God and his Church – the New Israel.

With us they will be sustained as part of the Body of Christ himself through the Eucharist in which the blood of the New Covenant flows from the Cross of Jesus to every altar where the memorial of his sacrifice is made. His self-offering is re-presented in an unbloody sacrifice on every altar of the Church somewhere at every minute in the world to sustain his Covenant with us by communing with us under appearances of bread and wine.

"I am your God. You are my own, my beloved people." Thanks be to God. God bless you richly this Holy Wek and Easter.

The Easter Vigil: A new dimension has opened up for mankind. Creation has become greater and broader. Easter Day ushers in a new creation, but that is precisely why the Church starts the liturgy on this day with the old creation, so that we can learn to understand the new one aright. At the beginning of the Liturgy of the Word on Easter night, then, comes the account of the creation of the world.

Two things are particularly important here in connection with this liturgy. On the one hand, creation is presented as a whole that includes the phenomenon of time. The seven days are an image of completeness, unfolding in time. They are ordered towards the seventh day, the day of the freedom of all creatures for God and for one another. Creation is therefore directed towards the coming together of God and his creatures; it exists so as to open up a space for the response to God's great glory, an encounter between love and freedom.

On the other hand, what the Church hears on Easter night is above all the first element of the creation account: "God said, 'let there be light!'" (*Gen* 1:3). The creation account begins symbolically with the creation of light. The sun and the moon are created only on the fourth day. The creation account calls them lights, set by God in the firmament of heaven. In this way he deliberately takes away the divine character that the great religions had assigned to them. No, they are not gods. They are shining bodies created by the one God. But they are preceded by the light through which God's glory is reflected in the essence of the created being.

What is the creation account saying here? Light makes life possible. It makes encounter possible. It makes communication possible. It makes knowledge, access to reality and to truth, possible. And insofar as it makes knowledge possible, it makes freedom and progress possible. Evil hides. Light, then, is also an expression of the good that both is and creates brightness. It is daylight, which makes it possible for us to act.

To say that God created light means that God created the world as a space for knowledge and truth, as a space for encounter and freedom, as a space for good and for love. Matter is fundamentally good, being itself is good. And evil does not come from God-made being, rather, it comes into existence only through denial. It is a "no".

At Easter, on the morning of the first day of the week, God said once again: "Let there be light". The night on the Mount of Olives, the solar eclipse of Jesus' passion and death, the night of the grave had all passed. Now it is the first day once again – creation is beginning anew. "Let there be light", says God, "and there was light": Jesus rises from the grave. Life is stronger than death. Good is stronger than evil. Love is stronger than hate. Truth is stronger than lies.

The darkness of the previous days is driven away the moment Jesus rises from the grave and himself becomes God's pure light. But this applies not only to him, not only to the darkness of those days. With the resurrection of Jesus, light itself is created anew. He draws all of us after him into the new light of the resurrection and he conquers all darkness. He is God's new day, new for all of us.

But how is this to come about? How does all this affect us so that instead of remaining word it becomes a reality that draws us in? Through the sacrament of baptism and the profession of faith, the Lord has built a bridge across to us, through which the new day reaches us. The Lord says to the newly-baptized: *Fiat lux* – let there be light. God's new day – the day of indestructible life, comes also to us. Christ takes you by the hand. From now on you are held by him and walk with him into the light, into real life. For this reason the early Church called baptism *photismos* – illumination.
