Cicero once said "Gratitude is not only the greatest of virtues, but the parent of all the others." More recently, Eileen Caddy said "Gratitude helps you to grow and expand; gratitude brings joy and laughter into your life and into the lives of all those around you." Naaman wanted to show his gratitude by taking the soil of Israel to his homeland out of respect of the God who cured him. The Samaritan came back to thank Jesus for healing him from Leprosy. Gratitude recognises the goodness (and the love) that lies behind the gesture of even the smallest act of kindness. It recognises that everything received is gift, including the air breathed, the ground walked upon, the sun, the wind and the rain. True gratitude recognises the mystery present in every gift as a mystery that speaks powerfully of the presence of a God of love and of life; of a God who seeks to lead us into the wholeness of life. AMORIS LAETITIA - THE JOY OF LOVE 2

IN THE LIGHT OF THE WORD The Bible is full of families, births, love stories and family crises. This is true from its very first page, with the appearance



of Adam and Eve's family with all its burden of violence but also its enduring strength (Genesis 4) to its very last page, where we behold the wedding feast of the Bride and the Lamb (Rev 21:2,9).

At the centre (of the family) we see the father and mother, a couple with their personal story of love.

The majestic early chapters of Genesis present the human couple in its deepest reality. Those first pages of the Bible make a number of clear statements. The first, which Jesus paraphrases, says that "God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." (Genesis 1: 27). It is striking that the 'image of God' here refers to the couple. God is the Creator (and) the fruitfulness of the human couple is a living and effective 'image', a visible sign of his creative act."
