

Ramblings for Reflection:

Whenever we feel low and the stresses and strains of life seem to be pressing the life out of us, we feel alone as though cut off from others, from the world, and often wonder where God is - we feel excluded in some way. Read the first reading from Wisdom this week, it reassures us that we are always, yes always, loved by a God who wants the best for us otherwise we wouldn't even be here. Knowing and not just believing that we are loved makes a big difference! The tax collector in the Gospel is someone despised and cast out purely because of the job he does - NOT FOR WHO HE IS. In fact he is not given a chance to prove his worth. Most of all he felt unloved, an outcast. As always, Jesus accepts us for who we are, not for what we have or haven't done, and that makes all the difference. Not only do we know we are loved but also that we are welcome and belong and that we are valued. And this is how Zacchaeus felt when Jesus invited himself to his house: valued, welcomed and included. Only when he was welcomed and acknowledged was he able to change, to do the things he had probably wanted to do for a long time, correct any misdeed he may have done knowingly or unknowingly - and be generous with his wealth. Something he was unable to do while he was an outcast!! Is there a message here for us???

AMORIS LAETITIA - THE JOY OF LOVE 4

In speaking of marriage, Jesus refers us to yet another page of Genesis, which, in its second chapter, paints a splendid and detailed portrait



of the couple. First we see the man, who anxiously seeks 'a helper fit for him' (v 18,20) capable of alleviating the solitude which he feels amid the animals and the world around him. The original Hebrew suggests a direct encounter, face to face, eye to eye, in a kind of silent dialogue, for where love is concerned. silence is always more eloquent than words. It is an encounter with a face, a 'thou', who reflects God's own love and is 'the finest (gift) he will ever have - a helper fit for him and a pillar of support.' (Sir 36.24) Or again, as the woman of the Song of Solomon will sing in a magnificent profession of love and mutual selfbestowal: "My beloved is mine and I am his...I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine" (2:16;6:3).
