THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C

PRAYER OF THE DAY: God. you support us in good times and in bad. Protect us when we are laughed at for following Jesus. Help us say and do the right things, so that through us other people may come to believe in your Son and make this world a place of love and of peace. We make this prayer to you through Christ our Lord.

FOCUS OF THE READINGS:

Our readings focus on fidelity.
The first reading, from the prophet
Malachi, draws a clear distinction
between good and evil, reward and
punishment. For the prophet the
end is clear—those who remain true,
who worship God, will be saved.

The Gospel passage deals with the end time. As we come to the end of the liturgical year, the liturgy takes us back to the question of the First Sunday of Advent, "When will the end of the world come?" Here, Jesus warns that before the end comes, Christians will be tested and tempted by false prophets and antichristian forces. But, as our response to the first reading affirms, nothing can take us from God's love. Jesus echoes

A reading from the prophet Malachi.

"The time is coming when people who do eval and who think they are better than others will be punished.

GOSPEL: Luke 21:7-19

A reading from the Gospel of Luke.

Some of the disciples asked Jesus when the end of the world would come.

Jesus said to them,

"Before the end comes, lots of things will happen. People will come and claim to be me. They will say,

'I am the Christ.

The time for the end of the world is here.'

"But don't believe them and don't follow them.
And when you hear about wars and riots,
don't be afraid.
Lots of awful things will happen on earth.

"People will hate you
because you believe in me and follow me.
They will put you in jail
and accuse you of doing wrong.
Then you can show them

that here, "Don't worry, I will give you the wisdom and words you need." He assures his disciples,

You will be saved, for you believe in me. You will be saved because you stayed with me.

REFLECTING ON THE READINGS WITH CHILDREN:

Invite the children to reflect on the human virtue of fidelity. You might ask them what qualities they look for in a true friend. You might set up some role-playing examples in which a friend must choose whether or not to be faithful. Ask the children to discuss the pros and cons. The point here is not to put the children to the test, but to help them see that fidelity requires choice. The ultimate question is "how would you want a true friend to respond?" Jesus wants us to remain faithful as his true friends. And he promises to help us when we are faced with difficulty in remaining faithful.

The children themselves will be able to supply examples of when they must choose to be faithful. They will frequently couch this in language of "good and bad," "being honest or lying," etc. While the reading refers to apostasy or martyrdom, the life experiences of little children are real for their age. Help them develop a sense of fidelity which will serve them well in serious matters later.
