
Hospital

Ramblings for reflection

Celebration, adulation, joy, praise, and uplift are all part of this exciting entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, after all, we much prefer celebrations even in the midst of sorrow or suffering. Celebration lifts our hopes, inspires, and creates the belief that anything is possible, and we all need those times in life. Jesus lived the present moment better than anyone and would have fully rejoiced with the people, whatever the future held. And the crowd were right! Jesus was the Son of David, the Messiah, the Christ. Jesus entry signified the authority and triumph the people saw in him. But, Jesus did not come as a victorious General or Conquering King but humbly, on a donkey. He had risen through the ranks, experiencing all the problems and difficulties of life, just as they had. He was one of them, and today they were backing him to be their Champion who would set them free from oppression, injustice and foreign rule. And they were right again! Jesus would be victorious, just not in the way they expected! Jesus victory would not involve violence, force, war or political wheeling and dealing as seen in the subsequent history of the Church. Steadfast to his Father's call Jesus sought to create right relationships, uphold the truth, and risk injury, not cause it, to achieve justice for the poor. Christians still follow this narrow path despite the consequences, suffering and rejection they encounter. The best tribute we can pay to Jesus, to show our deep gratitude and that he did not endure his passion in vain, is to join him on his last journey and be present at the defining events of the triduum: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Holy Week needs to be lived, we need to be present, because the victory it offers stretches way, way beyond understanding and knowledge.

The experiences and challenges of families (cont)

In some countries, many young people 'postpone a wedding for economic reasons, work or study. Some do so for other



reasons, the desire to avoid the failures of other couples: or because of fear of something they consider too important and sacred; the social opportunity and economic benefits associated with simply living together, a purely emotional and romantic conception of love; the fear of losing their freedom and independence, and the rejection of something conceived as purely institutional and bureaucratic.' We (the Synod) need to find the right language, arguments and forms of witness that can help us reach the hearts of young people, appealing to their capacity for generosity, commitment, love and even heroism, and in this way inviting them to take up the challenge of marriage with enthusiasm and courage.
