



Ramblings for reflection & 40th Anniversary Year A 2017

An anniversary is a celebration of thanksgiving for life in all its glory, pain and suffering, and its joy and achievement. And we owe it all to the Spirit who renews his commitment of love to us today. Oh Holy Spirit, we thank you. A Ruby anniversary reminds us that this life was won for us through the death and resurrection Christ; a blessing received and lived time and again in so many ways in the life of this great parish family. Red the symbol of lives offered, lives nourished, formed, motivated, and energised by the Holy Spirit. Far from perfect, maybe, but as real as the love that beats so strongly within it that we can say with Macrina Wiederkehr OSB: "I am aware of the many ways the Church has failed me, and I have failed her. Yet in the midst of these mutual failures, I claim this Church as mine. She is my Church, my home, my mother. I will not run away from her, for I have seen through the cracks of her frailty her tremendous splendour, her littleness and her greatness, her poverty and her wealth. I feel more fed than failed. Not everyone can say this, however, and so we are called to great sensitivity in this area. Together we have to accept both the burden and the grace of being Church. The Church is us. She is mine and she is me. She is yours and she is you. She is home, a broken home, yes! Broken, because you and I are broken." God loves us in all our brokenness and in all our brokenness we love God. This is the love we celebrate today!!

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The Archconfraternity of St. Stephen is a guild for altar servers begun in May 1905 by Fr. Hamilton MacDonald at Westminster Cathedral in London, England with the permission of Cardinal Francis Bourne. In November 1905, Pope St. Pius X gave his approval to the

Guild and his permanent apostolic blessing. In 1906, he raised it to an archconfraternity. The following year, the Guild's first handbook was published.

The Guild spread very quickly throughout Great Britain, but World War I saw the death by military action of many of its members, which nearly caused its extinction. It survived the Great War though, and afterwards, Fr. MacDonald laboured hard to ensure its successful re-establishment. In 1925, Cardinal Francis Bourne established a Central Council for the Archconfraternity, thereby ensuring its continuity. He set up the Guild in our Parish in February 1934.

In 1933, Fr. MacDonald died. Less than a year later in 1934, Pope Pius XI had extended the Archconfraternity to the entire British Commonwealth; Father had indeed lived to see his idea firmly established. In 1955, the Archconfraternity of St. Stephen made a Jubilee Pilgrimage to Rome, which included an audience with Pope Pius XII. Only a few short months earlier in 1954, he had canonized St. Pius X, who had done so much to forward the Guild's apostolate. With this fresh in the pontiff's mind, he suggested that the Guild also adopt St. Pius X as a patron, a suggestion taken up by the Guild.]

To bring us up to date, for our own parish, we celebrate 85 years of the Guild. We must give pride of place to Ben Smith, who since the early 70s has kept all the records of who has been a server and



when they received the medal up until the present day. Anyone interested can browse the book and find themselves and their friends from that time onwards! Ben has kept the Guild going through his dedication and desire to help our young people "help people to pray" as the Guild prayer goes. Fr Michael did the training for several years and handed it on to William Warren when he took over from Ben several years ago. William took over for several years and worked with Fr Michael to develop how the Guild functioned in our parish. The three of us worked to build up a structure to enrich the way developing our servers take responsibilities and look to becoming junior MCs. This allowed us to have a more informed team of servers. The Guild medal is given after a year of service on a regular basis at Mass or other services. After five years, the server is given the thick red cord and those who go on to take on more responsibility, the thick blue cord. The crowning glory is to become an MC, who receives the gold thick cord. The Guild chaplain is Fr Michael, who has a thick green cord and gold medal. William has had to retire, so at the moment we are creating a system of parishioners who set up the various Masses, and we are training new senior MCs, who together with Chris and Anne-Marie Warren, give dedicated service in the background, guiding the servers during the main Masses of the Church's year. Anne-Marie has also been giving encouragement and guidance to our servers when she is available, Chris does the same too, when work commitments allow.

Derek Shipman is another of our stalwart MCs who have been with us over many years but is ready to retire! Philippe James, is a long-standing MC at the 10.30am Mass and it is great to feel his commitment!

Nicola Sylvester has kindly taken on the administration side of the Guild's life, for which we are very grateful. We are still looking for more people to be involved, anyone who has been a server elsewhere in other parishes is welcome return and have a "refresher course". Full training is available for those who have never served in the past. Young people are more than welcome to join us too. Do make yourselves known to the MC on the Mass in which you share. We want to see a return to the 40 to 50 servers we did have a few years ago. Here's to our journey to our centenary! Fr Michael aa

AMORIS LAETITIA - THE JOY OF LOVE 34

The Vocation of the Family continues: Jesus began his public ministry with the miracle at the wedding feast of Cana (Jn 2:1-11). He shared in everyday moments of



friendship with the family of Lazarus and his sisters (Lk 10.38) and with the family of Peter (MK 8:14). He sympathised with grieving parents and restored their children to life (Mk 5:41; Lk 7:14-15). In this way he demonstrated the true meaning of mercy, which entails the restoration of the covenant (John Paul II, Dives in Misericordia, 4). This is clear from his conversations with the Samaritan woman (Jn 1:4-30) and with the woman found in adultery (Jn 8:1-11), where the consciousness of sin is awakened by an encounter with Jesus' gratuitous love.
