Ramblings for Reflection: One of the great things about God is that he comes to us as a Trinity. We reflect that Trinity in many wonderful ways. We look at ourselves inwardly e.g. selfesteem, outwardly to others and creation and upwards to God - a threefold movement. It is also present in our relationship with another person, for God is part of every relationship as the source of the love that unites. Jesus tells us that the best example of a loving relationship is marriage. And, unless the marriage relationship recognises and values the love that God offers, it cannot truly be called a marriage. Jesus is very careful in his teachings. "What God has joined together man must not divide!" Most of the divorces numbered in the media were never really marriages in the first place because God had not brought the two people together and was not present in the relationship. Many celebrities jump from one relationship to another, showing they have very little self-esteem and little understanding of the love God offers them. They must be poor, lonely creatures, devoid of any true relationship, living very miserable lives. Marriage is a sacred place where true happiness and self-fulfilment can be found. This is why God wants to be part of it, wants to make it work. In recognising God's integral presence in our relationships, we come to realise with St James, that, the one who sanctifies (God) and the ones who are sanctified (us), are of the same stock!! † ተተተተተተተተ

Oct 14 A Novena of Intercession to St. Oscar Romero and of thanksgiving for his canonisation (14th October in St Peter's in Rome), will take place at St Ignatius Church, Stamford Hill. Bishop John Sherrington will have celebrated Mass on 5th October. During this liturgy a new painting of Oscar Romero and Rutilio Grande will be unveiled, blessed and installed. The Romero Novena begins that evening with prayers and brief reflections at every Mass, and will continue until the Vigil of the canonisation, Saturday 13th October, with Mass at 7.00pm, at which Bishop Paul MacAleenan will preside and preach. A sculpted bust of Romero will be unveiled, blessed and installed in the church. Following both the opening and Vigil events, there will be refreshments and a chance for informal conversation in the Old Refectory. All are most welcome to attend.

We have received from CAFOD a letter that parishioners signed in support of the "POWER TO BE" campaign last year asking Melanie **one world** Robinson the UK representative at

the World Bank, on behalf of UK citizens, to support renewable energy projects instead of fossil fuel projects in developing countries, CAFOD writes: Thank you for supporting our "POWER TO BE" campaign by signing a postcard or on-line petition ... Along with you, more than 30 000 people across England and Wales - including schools, parishes, MPs, and Bishops, and religious, called on the World Bank to support local, renewable energy projects that tackles poverty. The World Bank announced that they will no longer finance oil and gas exploration and production after 2019. This is a big step forward and shows that the World Bank is prepared to transform its energy spending. Together we refused to accept that one-in-six people across the world live without access to electricity. Thank you to all that signed the petition. To follow on from this success, CAFOD is looking closer to home, with its new campaign, to Climate

Minister, Claire Perry, asking that the UK government begins a new phase of global leadership by example, and brings our own Climate targets in line with the 2015 Paris Agreement, which aims to limit global temperature rise to 1.5°C. Meeting the target would require the government to pursue what is called a "net zero emissions" goal. This would mean that the UK would be legally obliged by 2050 not to emit more carbon dioxide than is taken out of the atmosphere.
