FOCUS OF THE READINGS:

The readings focus on the special mission of two of the greatest leaders of the church. The first reading is somewhat of a farewell discourse. Paul seems certain that, having gone the limit, he will be killed for the faith. As he approaches his martyrdom, Paul is confident and even joyful. The Gospel gives us the beginning of Peter's ministry. Having professed faith in the person of Christ, he is assured of the permanence of the church and his role in it.

A reading from Paul's second letter to Timothy.

The Lord has always helped me, and he will save me from every evil and keep me safe for heaven.



REFLECTING ON THE READINGS WITH CHILDREN:

Since the Gospel reading appears elsewhere in the Sunday readings (Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time/Year A), it would seem appropriate today to concentrate on the two men themselves. Peter and Paul stand out among the saints, and even the apostles, as two giants of the early church. Their common feast has been celebrated in the church since the year 258.

There are several books for children which contain the lives of Peter and Paul which may be useful for presenting the highlights of their lives. We will want to avoid, however, pictures and stories which do not correspond to the Biblical presentation. For example, many books for both children and adults show pictures of Paul falling from a horse on the road to Damascus. There is no indication in any of the several accounts of Paul's conversion which suggests that. The accounts of their lives should focus on reality and the great contribution of these two men.
