16-23 May 2020 – 6th Sunday of Easter – Year A – the gospel according to Matthew

Parish Prayer: Lord Jesus, as the world copes with coronavirus, help us to remember that you are always with us. Grant wisdom to decision makers and bless all health workers. Bring healing to the sick; give peace to the anxious and comfort those who are sad. Stir us to show your love and mercy most especially to the poor and weak. This we ask in your name. Amen.

Ramblings Acts gives the impression that grace was being flung around like nobody's business, benefitting whole communities and reshaping their future. There was a great sense of newness of life in those early days and also of great hope to be shared with courtesy and respect as St Paul says. At the same time, an abundance of love flowed out of every word that Jesus spoke and every gesture he made. And, what is more, he promised to send the Holy Spirit, the Advocate. It is almost too much! Yet, these blessings were key to the growth of the early Church and, given our present semiincarceration, we are in special need of these gifts today. Take time to read through today's readings as though they were written for you. Feel the warmth, energy and encouragement that comes from them. This is certainly what Jesus wants for you. Although hugging has been sidelined of late, this is exactly what Jesus is doing to each one of you today (and every day). It is not so much feel the force but feel the warmth because it is a warmth that gives life, that energises, that lifts one spirits, that promotes the feeling that it is good to be alive. And this is precisely what we do in the love we offer others. The Spirit comes to enhance and multiply your love. Isn't this why we hug people: so that the love of Christ will come alive in them?

THE CATHOLIC CHURCH BISHOPS' CONFERENCE OF ENGLAND AND WALES

The Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has responded to the government's document released today, 11 May, titled 'Our plan to rebuild: The UK Government's COVID-19 recovery strategy'

Statement

The timing and the manner of the opening of churches touches profound sensitivities and spiritual needs. The Government's document and statements fail to recognise this.

The Government's position, established today, includes these steps aimed at opening churches as soon as possible: the establishment of a task force for places of worship, to work closely with 'stakeholders' in ensuring that premises are COVID-19 secure; and heeding the experience of other countries in which churches are already open for worship.

In dialogue with the Government, the Catholic Church will continue its engagement in this process and has already submitted a detailed plan, in full accordance with public health guidelines, for churches to be opened for private prayer.

The Church is ready to play its full part in the task force, understanding that this includes the possible earlier use of churches for private prayer, as a first safe step towards their use for public worship.

- Shampoo and conditioner


Bring all items to the hall kitchen door. Thanks for your generosity to help feed the people who need it most in our community. You are blessed indeed.
