

## Reflection Friday Week 12 - 2020

In Matthew, Jesus makes it very clear that he does not perform healings in order to win people over to faith in him. If anything, he seems to want to make it more difficult: *“Don’t tell anyone about this”* he says. Of course, those healed do not obey him. The short gospel today reveals the true compassion of Jesus. Our well-being is Jesus’ priority and therefore the priority of the Father and the Holy Spirit. Having spent time teaching through his sermon on the mount, Jesus now moves into action. How easily Jesus responds to people’s requests. This compassion, this concern for the well-being and goodness of others has certainly been mirrored during the Lockdown. Countless stories are told of good works, support and help that have taken place – creating an encyclopaedia of altruistic goodness and charity. As Lockdown is being eased let this altruism and goodness continue to flourish. Despite the financial, educational and job difficulties that lie ahead, new bonds of friendship abound, barriers between people demolished. All of this has helped strengthen the character and well-being of the nation and will see us through the challenges ahead. As we move forward, the slogans: **stay alert – control the virus – save lives** also apply to our faith. Continue to **stay alert** to those around you and respond to the needs that arise. **Control all that causes harm** – we can replace *virus* with racism, gender, creation, injustice. And, in the process, we will continue to **save lives!!**

We have deprived ourselves of the antibodies we need to confront adversity.*

*However, all this has uncovered for us once more that (blessed) common belonging, of which we cannot be deprived: our belonging together as brothers and sisters.”*
