

25 July - 1st August 2020 - 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A - the gospel according to Matthew

Parish Prayer: Lord Jesus, as the world copes with coronavirus, help us to remember that you are always with us. Grant wisdom to decision makers and bless all health workers. Bring healing to the sick; give peace to the anxious and comfort those who are sad. Stir us to show your love and mercy most especially to the poor and weak. This we ask in your name. Amen.

Ramblings G.K. Chesterton, the master of paradox, believed that we do not live in the best of all possible worlds, but that we live in the best all *impossible* worlds. Quite rightly understood that the whole of life was full of paradoxes. The most famous paradox being that Jesus gave away his life in order to gain life not just for himself but for us all. In giving away our lives to God, we gain the fulness of life. Newton's 3rd Law of Motion states that "For every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction." Thomas Aguinas said the same thing differently, "for every choice there is a renunciation." The stories Jesus tells us this week about the kingdom speak to our deepest desire which is our desire for God, although we often mistake it for something else. It is nevertheless true that we will sacrifice everything for something we truly desire - those we love, our burning passion, our desire for justice, our desire for peace, living more simply to help heal creation etc. Maybe the paradox this week is to see ourselves as God's treasure. Not a treasure to be owned but a treasure to be loved. A treasure for which God will do anything, even sacrifice his own Son. So, our prayer should be that of Solomon. To pray for an understanding heart capable of discerning good from evil. We are often better at discerning the evil in our lives than we are the good. Yet, it is the good (which we are) that reflects the presence and love of God. Our true treasure, then, is our love for God. Once we discover this we will also discover, as St Paul wrote to the Romans (8:28) that "all things work for the good for those who love God." And also, that the **impossible** can become real!

Additional guidelines for those coming to church

We have received two further pieces of guidance coming out of government legislation and quidelines as below

Worshippers should limit their interactions with anyone they are not attending church with, i.e. if they are attending corporate worship with one other household, wherever possible they should maintain social distancing with anyone outside of this group.

Face Coverings

Face coverings are currently mandatory on public transport and will be mandatory in shops and in supermarkets from 24th July 2020. People are also strongly encouraged to wear face coverings in enclosed public spaces where there are people they do not normally meet, such as a church.

We would stress then that all Mass attenders are strongly advised to wear a face mask when attending church. We know from feedback from parishioners who are watching Mass online that there is concern about inconsistent use of facemasks by people attending and many people are not coming to Mass until they are assured that all attendees are wearing masks. I would appeal to you to please do everything you can to help increase confidence in people about the safety of coming to worship in our church.
