Ramblings We are no strangers to rainbows and are familiar with the phrase, "I believe in God because of Rainbows!" Their existence led to the belief that, at the end of a rainbow, you would find a pot of Gold. Rather than magical, however, rainbows possess a mystical quality, an aura that speaks of something special and captivating. This is possibly why God chose it to mark his covenant with us. God's sign that he would never to seek to destroy us and also a sign of hope. Its presence signifies that the gloomy, grey sky and the damp weather will soon give way to sunshine and brightness. It's no wonder that we believe in God because of rainbows. Wouldn't it be helpful to know what Jesus hoped for when he entered the wilderness even if pushed there by the Holy Spirit? We don't even know how often Jesus went in search of a time of silence and to be alone with the God of rainbows in his early life. It did not appear to be unfamiliar territory to him. Having been baptised and having picked up his Cross, he would have sought help and guidance, and a better understanding of what lay ahead and to know if he was equal to the task. Surely, he discovered that God was with him throughout even if he felt the absence of God at times. He emerged, however, with energy and purpose. Without delay Jesus called people to him with words of repentance - and don't we all want to change our lives for the better, however good we might be? The way ahead for us is also daunting and uncertain, the challenges have yet to reveal themselves but, rest assured, the Spirit of God who has pushed us into this Lenten season will be there by our side. And, if ever you feel the Spirit has left you, just think of a Rainbow and that there is something more than gold to be found at the end!!


