

Parish Prayer: Lord Jesus, as the world copes with coronavirus, help us to remember that you are always with us. Grant wisdom to decision makers and bless all health workers. Bring healing to the sick; give peace to the anxious and comfort those who are sad. Stir us to show your love and mercy most especially to the poor and weak. This we ask in your name. Amen.

Ramblings The law of God written in our hearts is the law of love: love of God and love of neighbour. God is love and we are made in God's image. We focus on our failings, our sins, our omissions in Lent, to discover through God's mercy how much God loves us as well as the inner beauty with which we have been made. Macrina Wiederkehr writes: All too often we bemoan our imperfections rather than embrace them as part of the process in which we are brought to God. Cherished emptiness gives God space in which to work. We are pure capacity for God. Let us not, then, take our littleness lightly. It is a wonderful grace. It is a gift to receive. At the same time, let us not get trapped in the confines of our littleness, but keep pushing on to claim our greatness. Remind yourself often, "I am pure capacity for God; I can be more." Macrina adds: O God, help me to believe the truth about myself, no matter how beautiful it is. St Paul puts it like this "When I am weak then I am strong!" (2 Cor 12:10); only in weakness do we allow God free reign in our lives. Lent invites us to visit all the seasons of our hearts and lives and discover how God has been present in them all; present most especially in Jesus' dying and rising again: The seasons of my heart change like the seasons of the fields. There are seasons of wonder and hope, seasons of suffering and love, seasons of healing. There are seasons of dying and rising, seasons of faith.

Sorrow is a central theme of Lent: There's nothing like sorrow to get your attention. It is almost as though sorrow pulls presence out of you. In the midst of sorrow there's nothing to do but be there and celebrate the hurt. We celebrate the hurt through holy screams. Holy screams come from the heart. They are screams that people often, in their ignorance, try to smother. Don't let them take your screams away too early. Holy resignation comes only after holy screams.

Holy week services and how to book. We are delighted that this year we are open for our Holy week services remembering the

deprivation of last year. We have arranged our liturgies for Holy Week and because of the

continuing restrictions it is necessary everyone wishing to attend to book. Those arriving without a booking may not be able to attend if the church is fully booked.

The services you need to book for are as follows:

Palm Sunday 10am Mass Palm Sunday 12pm Mass Maundy Thursday Mass of the Last Supper 7pm **Good Friday Service 3pm** Easter Vigil Saturday 7pm **Easter Sunday 10am Mass Easter Sunday 12pm Mass**

Morning prayer is at 10am on:

Maundy Thursday Good Friday Holy Saturday

No need to book for these.

Good Friday private prayer with led stations of the Cross

The church will be open from 11-2 and 4-6 for private prayer with a Stations of the Cross led by Ann Milner being projected every hour. You just need to use the NHS app and the QR code or sign your name and number for track and trace purposes. Sit where you like in the church and place an X where you sit so no-one else will sit in that place. We will be cleaning the church before the 3pm service.

The information we require from you when you book is;

- your name
- contact telephone number (for track and trace)
- the number in your household attending
- the services you would like to attend.

We will do our best to give you your choices. You can book in the following ways

You can assume you have your bookings. We will contact you if we are not able to fulfil all your choices.

The church is being retaped to ensure we are still socially distanced by 1m+ which will increase our capacity. However we will still have to separate households which means that we have a capacity of 32 single spaces and 18 half pews for 2 or more for each service.

CATHOLIC BISHOPS' CONFERENCE OF ENGLAND AND WALES

Statement from the Presidency Bishops' Conference on the National Day of Reflection for COVID-19 Tuesday 23rd March **2021** We welcome the designation of Tuesday 23rd March as a National Day of Reflection to mark the anniversary of the first national lockdown with a minute's silence at midday and doorstep vigils of light at 8pm. We ask you all to make this not only a Day of Reflection but also a Day of Prayer. In reflection we ponder on all that has taken place; in prayer we bring this to our Heavenly Father. For all who live by faith in God, reflection and prayer always go hand in hand. Prayer completes reflection. Reflection informs prayer. Prayer opens our life to its true horizon. Without prayer we live in a foreshortened world and are more easily swamped by its clamour and tragedy. Throughout this difficult year, so many have been inspired by prayer, so much effort sustained in prayer, in every place. So let us make the 23rd March truly a day of prayer. March 2020 was the first time our churches had to be closed. It is our hope that on this day, every one of our churches will be open. We invite everyone to enter a church on this day, to reflect and pray in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. We know this will involve an extra effort, but this can be part of our important contribution to a significant moment in the life of our country. Indeed, we ask that you might invite a friend, neighbour or colleague to come to church with you as you make this visit. There is so much on which to reflect and include in our prayer. We reflect in sorrow on all those who have died, whether family members, friends or those unknown to us personally. We pray for them, asking our Father to welcome them into their

heavenly home, the destiny for which God first gave us the gift of life. We reflect with compassion on all those who have suffered during this last year, whether through illness, stress, financial disaster or family tensions. We pray for their ongoing resilience, courage and capacity to forgive. We reflect with thanksgiving for the generosity, inventiveness, self-sacrifice and determination shown by so many in this most difficult of times. We pray for them, thanking God for their gifts and dedication, whether they are scientists, politicians, health workers, public servants of every kind, community leaders or steadfast family members and friends who continue to show such love and compassion. We reflect in hope that, as the pandemic is controlled and we open up our lives again, we will gather in the lessons we have learned and build our society into a better shape, more compassionate, less marked by inequalities, more responsive to needs and deprivation. We ask for the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to guide and strengthen us in this endeavour, whether we are focusing on overcoming family breakdowns. buildina recovery. political consensus. Christian prayer is, of course, centred on Jesus Christ, the one who is "lifted up" before us "so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him" (John 3.13). We pray with Jesus, in him and through him, for he is the one who carries us, and our prayers, into the embracing presence of his Father. He is our comfort in sorrow, our strength in the face of need, our rejoicing in the gifts we celebrate and our hope in the face of the weighty darkness of death. May Tuesday 23rd March be a great day of prayer that this pandemic comes to an end and that the gift of God's Holy Spirit will carry us all forward to a new and better life, both here and in the world to come.

They now urgently need the following:


