Ramblings In reflecting on the death of Jesus, Ronald Rolheiser writes that, during his passion, alone. betraved. humiliated. Jesus was misunderstood, the object of jealousy and crowd hysteria, that he was a stone's throw away from everyone, that those who loved him were asleep to what was really happening, . . . this moral loneliness, mocked by those outside, tempted him against everything he had preached and stood for during his life and ministry. What made his sacrifice so special was not that he died a victim of violence nor that he refused to use divine power to stop his death. What made his death so special is that, inside all the aloneness, darkness, jealousy, misunderstanding, sick crowd hysteria, coldness, and murder, he held out, he gave himself over, without bitterness, without self-pity, holding his ideals intact, gracious, respectful, forgiving, without losing his balance, his meaning, or his message. Reflect on this a while. Now think of the appalling, cruel, abusive and brutal way we have treated creation. Remember, creation bears the imprint of its creator, God, and reflects God's image to us. This is why we are often stunned by its beauty. Yet, despite all that we have done to creation, it too is without bitterness or self-pity. It remains gracious, respectful, forgiving and balanced - a reflection of Jesus? If we could only recognise this, we would make any necessary sacrifice to bring it healing and show it love and respect. During the first pandemic lockdown, CO2 emissions fell sharply, allowing the environment, almost immediately, to show signs of a new beauty as its colours became brighter and richer. It was creation's way of saying thank you. If we truly love God, love Jesus Christ, we will do everything we can to reverse the downward slide of our climate and allow us to enjoy its wonder of new birth for generations to come.

The Prayer of the Synod: Adsumus Sancte Spiritus

Attributed to St. Isidore of Seville (560-636), it has been traditionally used at Councils and Synods for hundreds of years. The version below was adapted by Fr Tom for the Church's Synodal journey from 2021 to 2023

We gather together in the Holy Spirit who guides us and make a home in our hearts; teach us the way we must go and how to pursue it. We are weak and sinful; do not let us promote disorder. Do not let ignorance misdirect or influence our actions. Let us find in You our unity as we journey together to eternal life Let us not stray from the truth and what is right. This we ask of you at work in every place and time, in the communion of the Father and the Son, forever. Amen.

Keeping warm and safe in church.

The boiler for the church and hall needs to be replaced and whilst that is happening we will not have any




heating available. When it is operational we will only have the heating on before the Masses not during. You are advised to wear warm clothing. As the numbers of covid cases continue to increase we will not be removing the remaining tape in the church any time soon. The front three rows are untapped but the rear rows are still distanced for those who are more comfortable at



a distance. We still ask that people wear masks at all times if possible and particularly at 10.30am when we have singing.

To ensure you get seats at the 10.30am Mass you are advised to arrive early as we are beginning to get full at this Mass. There is still plenty of space at the Sat 6pm and Sunday 8.30am Masses.



Children's liturgy We plan to start the Children's liturgy at the 10.30 Mass at the start of Advent. This will take place in the hall at present. As the number of children attending Mass is quite low we plan on having one group of school age in the hall and if there are sufficient younger children we will resume the liturgy for the parents and young children also. We can only offer this if we have the support of adults to help so if you are willing to help once a month please let Trish know as soon as possible. Training is available.

You and your child can explore our exciting learning environment, including our new outside garden and talk to our experienced staff about what we have to offer.



We have only 23 days before Pope Francis and others kick off the 26th United Nations Climate Change Conference in Glasgow. Support Pope Francis now: Sign the Healthy Planet, Healthy People petition. COP26 is an opportunity like no other. World leaders will make decisions that will affect our common home for generations.

Everyone, no matter religion, country, or race, should respect creation. We are running out of time, and there's a lot to do. It's not easy to make this huge change, but we need to start somewhere. Why not sign and promote the petition?

By now more than 100,000 Catholics and 300 organizations have joined this initiative.

We are asking four simple things:

- Tackle the climate emergency and biodiversity crisis together
- Limit warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius and promise no more biodiversity loss
- Ensure equitable global action, including support for those most affected
- Protect and respect human rights, including the rights of Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities in climate and biodiversity action

Pope Francis will be there. For the first time, a Pope is attending a UN Climate Change Conference. That's how important this is. Support Pope Francis: Sign the petition.

As Catholics, it is our responsibility to lift up the voices of the most vulnerable and advocate on their behalf. If we don't, who will? It's truly up to us. We must act now. Sign the petition.

God's creation is suffering. And we're running out of time. Join the global Catholic family and take action now.

A message from Rob Hitchcock about the COP 26 Climate Summit. I have been selected to attend the COP 26 Climate summit that is taking place in Glasgow. The summit is 2 weeks long and global leaders including Pope Francis will gather to share idea on how to tackle climate change. Leaders will examine the impact of climate change through different lenses e.g., the financial aspect, gender equality and youth and public engagement just to name a few.

On Saturday 6th November there is planned an opportunity for people to gather to call on world leaders to commit to real change rather than it about another meetina something that politicians are very good at. There are marches planned one in Glasgow the other in London. CAFOD will have representation in both locations and have spaces for people to join them. The COP 26 meeting will be considered successful if world leaders commit to keeping the global temperatures within 1.5° C of warming, and to ensure that nobody is left behind whilst trying to achieve this.

The marches that are planned to happen on the 6th November is something physical that we can do. However, as people of faith we know that the world and humanity are closely connected, as we learn in Genesis how God fashioned humanity; it was from the earth; the same earth which is being destroyed by the few affecting the many. The negative effects include extinction of more extreme weather, animals. and the displacement of people.

Due to our closeness to the earth, I believe as well as physically preparing for these major talks, we must spiritually prepare. I think as a parish we should come together to prayer for real change. I invite you to come to pray for this intention in front of the Blessed Sacrament. Each day the week beginning Monday 1st November- Sunday 7th November after Mass the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed for an hour which will enable us to come together as a community to pray for the success of the meeting.
