To do this well we depend on the Holy Spirit to guide us. This demands trust and courage and an overall desire to be of service to others as Jesus was in his day. To discover better your inner gifts, your shared solidarity, your strengths and weaknesses, all of which will help as we journey together more confidently and with a deeper realisation of Church.
