Chair's report to the Pastoral Parish Council – Roger Hyde 10th January 2022.

Just to refresh your memories for 2022

The steering group with Fr Tom, has met twice since the last meeting and positive acceptable ideas have come from lengthy discussions and help from Parish records.

The use of our facilities has been noted from records of stake holder use and with an expansive view of the future taken into account, we now have a good idea of what will be needed.

The idea is to approach the future in two ways.

Firstly to refurbish all the various properties on our estate to the standard required by our experience of living with Covid. This means ventilation, lighting, decorating and re furnishing where appropriate.

This will include the car parking area for Fr Tom and another and a look at the garden area between the Presbytery and Fr Andrews flat and hopefully the transfer of the stained glass windows in the hall to other places replacing with plain lattice windows.

This exercise, we feel should be commenced as soon as possible leaving any new Scout Hut rebuild to follow on in its due time.

The second plan after reviewing our meeting with the architects on Wednesday last is to make the new build a similar size to the existing Scout Hut and adjoin the new building in some way to the existing kitchen / toilet area which in truth has all the facilities needed for both buildings

Financially this makes very good sense.

Parts of the interior will need to be modified to allow for a shower and revamped kitchen to allow entry from both halls and storage areas.

By adopting this plan the parking place numbers will also increase from 30 to 36 places. Good news for some.

However the problem of random parkers will still be with us, and need to be resolved at a later date.

Ideas have been drawn to guide the architects and can be shown is required.

We now await what the technically design could look like in the very near future and also approaching the NHDC planning to see if it is an acceptable plan.

All modifications to the Kitchen / toilet area made will be to facilitate the new design.

COP 26 Report for PPC Meeting 9th November 2021 – Robert Hitchcock

The general tone of Climate summit held in Glasgow was positive; which is unusual. The major announcements made during in the first week were in fact nothing new they were presented differently or new nations had signed up. However, it did set a tone of positivity and determination to bring about change.

The real sticking point that would determine whether this time in Glasgow is considered successful is the terms 'loss and Damage', the official terms are 'Adaptation and Mitigation'. In the simplest of terms this is like an insurance policy. Where there is damaged generally a payout is wanted. The developing world is currently experiencing the effects of Climate change. They want the richer nations to pay them compensation for their "Loss and Damage" that has been caused due to Climate change. The contention is of course that the richer nations have not provided the funds; the situation has intensified and the developing world's situation has not improved in fact the opposite it has deteriorated significantly. As a consequence, people are being left behind because they are unable to mitigate and adapt to the constant evolution of the planet.

The negotiation process is favoured by the richer nations because negotiations happen all round the clock and all through the night. They do not have sessions; negotiators come with an agenda some things are negotiable and others are not. Each nation sends as many people as

possible the greater the number of delegates the more influence the nation will have over proceedings. This is because nations will be able to have representation in a larger number of negotiations as all the negations happen simultaneously this also allows delegates to divide the time between each other to enable them to refresh and sleep. This obviously is not as effective if you do not have the luxury of having a large team of negotiators. This is where organisations like CAFOD play their part because they have the opportunity to converse with negotiators to voice the concerns of the developing world.

At the end of the negotiations a document will be produced each nation votes whether to agree to what has been negotiated, the document is not legally binding they are guidance meaning nations can interpret them to fit the country's situation. The exception is the 'Paris Climate Agreement 2015.' This is the only legal binding document on Climate change. If one nation votes against the proposals then the whole process collapses.

The Vatican delegation has a strong influence in the negotiations particularly in those countries that are strongly Catholic. An example of this is when the time came to vote on the proposals put forward during the Paris Climate conference in 2015 it was thought that Nicaragua would vote against the proposal meaning the process would have collapsed. The Vatican delegation conversed sternly with Nicaragua to convince them to vote in favour. They did vote in favour and the agreement was passed.

I think generally there is a lot of positivity to take from Glasgow but also recognition of the fact that there is still a very long way to go; which may be perceived as a daunting task. We need to keep the pressure on those who have the power to bring real change but also continue to do the things that we are able to do at grassroots level.

Baptism
