Ramblings Isn't it interesting that Jesus doesn't answer the lawyer's question but turns the question around? Telling the story of the Good Samaritan, Jesus asks Who is the neighbour? This suggests it is not so much defining who a neighbour is but whether we can recognise neighbourliness in others. We often call neighbourliness caring, compassion, altruism, selflessness, generosity and goodness. Further reflection suggests that all these qualities exist within us whether we use them or not. How so? Both Moses and Paul make it clear that God dwells within is, that we are made in the image of God. Christ is an integral part of our whole being or, as Moses says, the Word of God lives in our minds and in our hearts. The greatest of all treasures lives within each of us but we often fail to recognise Christ's presence and, even if we do, we fail to make use of it. The Good News is that failures of the past do not have to be the failures of the future.

A well-founded belief says that the faults we see in others are the faults we have in ourselves only worse. But this belief also works the other way. The goodness we see in others reflects the goodness within ourselves. This is evident in the case of the lawyer in the story. Whether he uses these gifts is a choice he has to make but he recognises the neighbour. The same applies to us and remember that, when we use the gifts within us personified in Christ's presence, they grow stronger not weaker!

Pope Francis: Our love for God and neighbour is our passport to heaven. Our earthly possessions are dust that scatters, but the love we share – in our families, at work, in the Church, and in the world – will save us, for it will endure forever. <u>Next Week: Readings Gen 18:1-10, Col 1:24-28, Luke 10:38-42</u>

Before covid we had a Parent and Toddler group which had been running for at least 35 years and ran from 9.30-11.15am on Mondays and Fridays. We have two cupboards full of resources and toys. The children of the Mothers who ran the group have now grown up and so they no longer have children who would attend the group. So we need to start it up again from fresh.

What do we need to do that?

- Parents who are willing to co-ordinate the group
- Parents who are willing to set up the resources at the start of the sessions
- Someone who is willing to be the treasurer for the bank account
- Parents or other parishioners who will help run simple activities (crafts, reading, singing etc) in the sessions
- Other parishioners who will help do tea and coffee for parents and snacks for the children
- Parents who are willing to pack up the resources at the end of the sessions
- Parents or other parishioners who will help clean up at the end of the sessions

The more people who offer to help, the smaller the work load for any one individual.

What do you and your children get in return?

- A chance to socialise with other adults and children and enjoy conversation and structured play.
- Entertaining activities for your children which will stimulate them and hopefully tire them too!
- A sense of community and purpose.

Hopefully we will be able to do some simple prayer services with the children as one of the activities.

If you are interested in attending such a group with or without children please let Trish know so start making preparations for we can а September return. We will start with a Monday session and see if the interest is great enough to do a Friday session later.

We look forward to hearing from all our parents with young children and other parishioners who want to help young families in this way.

A BIG Thank You to everyone that have come on the recycling journey with us, and contribute their "waste" to be recycled, to be re-purposed, and kept out of landfill sites or an incineration fate.

Despite the changes in what we can collect for recycling, we look forward to see the support

from the community for the remaining schemes and the new waste streams now on offer.

Since we started collecting in Dec 2012 - we have collected and sent for recycling <u>22,270.214Kg</u> (ie: over 22 tons) of waste.

We have raised funds for these charities in total so far:

WORLD YOUTH DAY 2023 - LOOKING TO LISBON World Youth Day 2023 will take place in Lisbon in the beginning of August 2023. Diocese of Westminster Youth Ministry with support from Cardinal's Appeal is offering a limited number of places on this pilgrimage with a 50% discount to young people between the ages of 16-25. Any 16 year olds who apply will need to be finishing year 12 by the start of World Youth Day pilgrimage. These young people will commit to a series of preparatory sessions from September 2022, to prepare them to assist in support roles during the pilgrimage, such as by acting as small group leaders, and also offer formation to them which will be helpful in living their faith post-World Youth Day. Catholic Listeners Telephone Helpline The new confidential listening helpline was launched in April. **Catholic Listeners**, Diocese of Westminster, has been set up for those who are returning to the faith. The helpline is all about listening to others, listening to those who might have become isolated due to the pandemic. This service is based on the **Landings** ethos of compassionate listening. Although we are not a counselling service, we have a professional team trained on signposting to other services and agencies.

Sometimes just communicating with someone who listens and understands can help clarify a way forward. Simply talking about a problem can ease a burden. We aim to help those in need of a safe space to talk.

To date there have been 28 calls received with typical queries being:


- Just to enquire what the service is about.
- To voice their frustrations about the Church during lockdown, not being able to attend Mass.
- To talk about the complexities that came with lockdown within their relationships and households and having no one to talk to. Two referrals have been made to counselling.
- There have been those wanting to know more

about how they can increase and strengthen their faith and those individuals have signposted to **Landings**.

• They also have a caller who is now a regular, and has informed them that they are lonely and look forward to having someone to talk to.

One of the early apostolates of the Assumptionists was pilgrimages. As a young priest Fr d'Alzon walked with pupils from the school at Nimes to local shrines; It was not until later in the nineteenth century that pilgrimages were possible due to an improved political situation in Israel. For the first one a boat was bought sailing from France to Israel. There were few hotels and people had to sleep under canvas. Eventually the Fathers built a hostelry in Jerusalem as well as purchasing land for research at a site where the high priest had lived. This is where our centre in Jerusalem is today under the name of St Peter at cockcrow.
