Reflection Tuesday Week 24 St John Chrysostom 2022

St John Chrysostom (349 - **407)** was born in Antioch. After a thorough education, he adopted an ascetic life, was ordained a priest and became a fruitful and effective preacher. He was elected Patriarch of Constantinople in 397, energetically reforming the ways of the clergy and the laity alike. He incurred the displeasure of the Emperor and was twice forced into exile. After 3 years of the second exile to Armenia, it was decided to send him still further away but he died on the journey, worn out by his hardships. His sermons and writings helped explain the Catholic faith and encouraged living the Christian life: his eloquence earned him the surname "Chrysostom" (Greek for "golden mouth").

It would not be unreasonable for us to think of Queen Elizabeth II as having a Golden Mouth:
