## Reflection Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> Week Easter St Bede 2023

St Bede the Venerable (673) was born in the north of England near Wearmouth monastery. He joined the monastery and spent all his life there or at Jarrow, teaching and writing. He was an outstanding ecclesiastical author. He wrote commentaries on Scripture; an ecclesiastical history of the English people, a unique and irreplaceable resource for much of early English history; and the first martyrology (collection of saints' lives) to be compiled on historical principles. He was the first known writer of English prose, though this has not survived. He died at Jarrow on 25<sup>th</sup> May 735: he taught and worked until the last moments of his life. He is venerated as the "light of the Church" in the Dark Ages, and as a forerunner of the 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> century renaissance of the Western Church.
