To be allowed to return to their homeland after decades in exile must have been received with deep joy and thanksgiving by the people of Israel. Even more so was the blessed news that they would be able to rebuild the temple and receive the necessary help to do so. The homes of the families must have been filled with thanksgiving and praise day after day. To have the temple rebuilt was tantamount to saying that the people had atoned for theirs sins and infidelity and that there were now, once again, back in God's favour and God's chosen people.

This restored temple was the one that Jesus knew and from which he drove out the money changers and sellers.
