O God, help me take away all the clutter with which I decorate my crosses, with all the ways I try to camouflage your death and dying because my faith has not grown enough and to look at death as it really is: an emptiness that brings me face to face with LIFE.

O God, Your love has opened my eyes. It is my own pink-edged crosses that have broken my heart. But your cross has saved me!
