Jesus cures the leper

INTRODUCTION

Jesus never judged people by their appearance or paid any attention to what others thought of them. Time and again he made tax-collectors and other outcasts feel welcome and loved. Today we hear how Jesus changed the life of a leper who asked for his help.

SIGN OF THE CROSS

LIGHT THE CANDLES

Light the candles and say Candle Prayer 2: Show me, show me little candle.

SORRY

After a few moments of quiet reflection, ask one of the children to choose a sorry colour and say the corresponding prayer together.

GLORIA

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

To welcome today's Gospel sing Acclamation 3: Alleluia, alleluia.

GOSPEL (cf Mark 1:40-45)

One day a leper came to Jesus, and falling on his knees he said to Jesus, 'If you really wanted to, you could help me and cure my leprosy.'

Jesus was filled with compassion, and reaching out to touch him, he said, 'Of course I want to help you!'

At that moment the leprosy disappeared and the man was cured. Jesus sent him away asking him not to tell anyone about what had happened, but the man was so overjoyed he told everyone he met. Soon crowds of people followed Jesus wherever he travelled.

DISCUSSION

Do you know what a 'leper' is? – A leper is the name given to a person suffering from a terrible disease called leprosy.

Do you know anything about leprosy and what can happen to people who suffer from this disease? – Leprosy is an infectious disease which if untreated can deform and cripple people who suffer from it. It is caused by a tiny germ and attacks the hands, feet, and other parts of the body. Lepers cannot feel the infected parts of their bodies and often through injury, lose fingers and toes. What happens if you catch an infection like measles or chickenpox?

Are you allowed to go to school and mix with your friends? – To avoid anyone else catching your illness you are usually kept at home, and away from everyone else.

In Jesus' time, how do you think lepers were treated by other people? – Lepers were sent to live together, far away from the towns and villages. They carried bells or shouted aloud so that people could hear them coming, and could avoid them. Because of their disfigurements people were frightened by their appearance, and they led sad and miserable lives.

How did Jesus treat the leper? – Jesus reached out and touched the leper as a sign of his deep love and willingness to help. Because of this love, Jesus completely transformed the leper's life so that he no longer had to suffer.

Does leprosy still exist today? – Leprosy thrives where there is poverty and it is still common in Asia, Africa and South America. (If possible, show the children where these countries are on a map or globe.) Because it can be cured with modern medicines, lepers are no longer treated as outcasts to be afraid of. People have learned to treat lepers with the same kindness and love as Jesus did.

ACTIVITY

Help the children to make a picture with a sliding figure of the leper, before and after, Jesus cured him.

CREED

CLOSING PRAYER

Jesus,

just as the leper trusted in your love and compassion, we can too.

Help all those who are suffering or ill, and touch them with your love so that their lives will be transformed. Lord hear us.
