

ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

16TH JUNE 2024

Gospel: *Mark 4: 26-34*

It is the smallest of all the seeds; yet it grows into the biggest shrub of them all.

Looking at the horizon is not the limit of our sight. Viewing the setting of the sun does not negate the dawn on the morrow. The greatest discoveries of humanity have come about by people looking beyond their natural sight. Trusting in the experience and findings of others, and working with the received laws of nature, they helped to bring into reality something far greater than what they had even envisioned. Perhaps it's a secular version of having hope and faith, although interestingly many discoverers have been religious people. We are wired as human beings to look beyond our immediate circumstances, to think of a better world. If we consider the cultures of the world, most human beings envisage some form of existence beyond death. For Christians, all endeavours to look beyond our immediate circumstances are ultimately



directed to God, who is the answer to all our hopes and faith. There is within each of us a dissatisfaction with the way things are, because we are searching for realities as yet unattainable. Only God can satisfy these yearnings and desires. St Augustine of Hippo, after whom our church is named, said that the human heart is restless until it finds its rest in God. God wants to re-orientate our desires. Desire can become disordered, if our desire is for mere material things, since desire is satisfied only when those things are transcended by the spiritual. St Paul tells us today that we can never feel at home in visible things, but only in the things of heaven which we cannot see. We are exiles in search of the far greater than the transitory tangible or momentary pleasurable. This is similar to what St Peter says, that we are refugees seeking God's eternal city. Therefore, we exercise faith and hope. We embark upon a journey of discovery, led by the Spirit, realising the limitations of our senses. Our natural habitat is to be exiled from our bodies of frailty since we long for our glorious resurrected bodies. Yet our natural bodies are to be honoured, since they are God-given, and we have a duty of care their wellbeing, for, 'we are intent on pleasing him'. Our bodies, and how we treat them, and indeed the bodies of others, St Paul says, will call us to account. Christ, who was born for us as a physical body, is concerned for our material as well as our spiritual welfare. He nourishes us with the good things of creation but above all the transforming grace of his own body and blood. Through his real presence in Word and Sacrament our bodies are fed. The open book of creation reveals the abundance of God's provenance and signs of his providence. Jesus regularly drew spiritual truths about God's kingdom from the world around us. In today's gospel, he invites us to consider the growth of a seed. We do not cause the hidden seed to grow, yet it appears, first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. In a similar way, once the seed of God's word has been received, God's kingdom grows. It grows imperceptibly, yet inevitably. We are not the instrumental causes of its growth, though we have a role to play in the process. The parable reminds us that the appearance of God's kingdom takes us by surprise. It is God alone who transforms us and the world, through the activity of his Word and Holy Spirit. If we focus on what is only visible then we will miss the deeper, hidden truth. As in the natural world, so in the supernatural, what is dismissed of no consequence can turn out to be of the greatest significance and implication. Long established prejudices and presuppositions will be overturned. We should never despise the day of small things and what may appear to be inconsequential. Today, Ezekiel's prophecy proclaims, 'every tree of the field will learn that I, the Lord, am the one who stunts tall trees and makes the low one grow, who withers green trees and makes the withered green'. Our bodies might be frail but in Christ they have an eternal destiny. We must never become so fixated upon the circumstances that we see, as to forget the circumstances that we cannot see. Faith is endlessly hopeful and hope is endlessly faithful. On this Day for Life let us give thanks for precious life, held in frail and fallible bodies, which through God's grace can be transfigured and touched, and ultimately changed from glory Fr Julian into glory.
