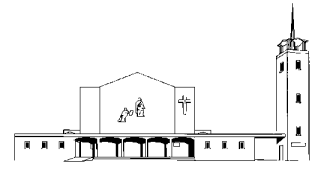

YEAR B TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 1ST SEPT 2024

Gospel: *Mark 7: 1-8, 14-15, 21-23*

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.

Whilst a student, I used to like a stage sketch of a woman who goes to her medical practice and asks for a new heart. There is a complete misunderstanding between doctor and patient because she is not talking of a physical heart but of her spiritual heart. Physical transplants are mercifully few, less so than other cardiac problems, requiring open surgery, or intervention to resolve issues such as arrhythmias, congenital defects, coronary artery disease, valve problems and aneurysms. Not everyone will need work done on their physical heart. In contrast, everyone needs surgery on their spiritual heart. Indeed, the two may be related, for not infrequently physical disease can be related to our lack of spiritual ease. This is especially so, when our human hearts are in a desperate state. The gospel tells us that humanity's spiritual problem is more pervasive than any physical heart disease, and calls for urgent attention. Our hearts are the seat, Jesus tells us today, of evil intentions: 'fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly'. Often society explains these vices away in environmental, educational, social or psychological terms. No such explanation excuses our personal responsibility in fostering them. Jesus places them squarely at our feet. Sin is the working out of what rests in the very depth of our being, and its resolution is not cosmetic, but the conversion of our hearts. Through the cross, God has provided the remedy. When we surrender ourselves to Christ, when we die to our old self, accept his saving work on our behalf, and embrace his risen life, with all its implications for ourselves and for others, we find that his power works within us changing us inside out. While the eradication of spiritual disease is on-going, the root cause of our disaffection-sin -has been dealt with once for all through the cross of Christ and the pouring out of his Spirit. This is what God had always intended. Did not Ezekiel prophesy? 'And I will give you a new heart, and a new spirit I will put within you. And I will remove the heart of stone from your flesh and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my Spirit within you, and cause you to walk in my statutes and be careful to obey my rules'. The changing of our inner-man enables us to obey what God wants, so that the outer man changes as well. At the heart of God's covenantal relationship were the laws which he asked his people to obey. In our first reading from Deuteronomy, Moses tells the people: 'Now Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life'. Jesus never abrogated those laws. He fulfilled them in his person, and he enables those who live in him to fulfil them as well. The laws become a battle ground between Jesus and the Jewish religious leaders because they had evolved ways of interpreting them, known as the oral tradition or the 'tradition of the elders'. They accuse Jesus and his disciples of not observing these 'traditions'. Moreover, since the religious leaders regard these traditions as boundary markers for who was religiously pure or not, they regard those who do not observe them as sinners. Jesus completely demolishes their fabrications. Religious purity does not depend upon observing unbiblical traditions but upon the conversion of the heart by following what God wants, and rooting out the vices of the heart. It is a salutary warning for ourselves. Do we observe the commandments of God and the godly tradition handed down to us? Or do we place alongside them as of equal importance what is merely customary resulting in our unfounded sense of religious superiority over others, forgetting that God looks at the heart, and not outward appearances? Are we outwardly religious but inwardly diseased with vices? We need open-heart surgery, and there is help at hand. The Heart Surgeon has a hundred percent success rate in his operations. Even so it is good practice to wash our hands before eating, though it will not make us pure.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST GREGORY THE GREAT 3RD SEPTEMBER



Pope Gregory I, better known in English as Gregory the Great, was pope from 3rd September 590 until his death in 604. Gregory is well known for his writings, which were more prolific than those of any of his predecessors as pope. Throughout the Middle Ages he was known as “the Father of Christian Worship” because of his exceptional efforts in revising the Roman worship of his day. He was the first of the popes to come from a monastic (Benedictine) background. Gregory is a Doctor of the Church and one of the Latin Fathers. For us in England he is remembered most especially as the Pope who sent St Augustine (of Canterbury) from Rome to England to convert the English tribes, which he successfully did. As a result, Pope Gregory is sometimes referred to as the ‘Apostle of the English.’ The image above is part of the decoration in the chapel of the Benedictine saints in Westminster Cathedral. Immediately after his death, Gregory was canonized by popular acclaim. He is the patron saint of musicians, singers, students and teachers.
