As we enter the third week of Advent, the cry of the Baptist recedes to make way for the second figure of Advent, Mary. She rises to invite us to the crib to which we will journey (very) soon after the fourth Sunday of Advent. No sooner than we have the 4th week of Advent this year than we are on to Christmas day. But this last week of Advent still has much to offer us, as we wait. From the 17th start what are known as the 'O' Antiphons. These preface the Evening Prayer of the Divine Office which all priests and religious are required to pray. They are so called because they address the Messiah, the One to come with increasing desire and urgency, under several of his titles: *O Wisdom, O Adonai, O Stock of Jesse...* you can hear many of these antiphonal cries in the hymn *O Come. O Come Emmanuel.*

The end of our calendar year, no doubt, carries with it its share of memories. Maybe there were promises and hopes which remained unfulfilled this year; maybe there were sufferings too hard to bear, but maybe there were also joys for which to give thanks. It is good to wait for the Lord, the Psalmist says (Ps 37,39,40,62..), and to wait with patience. Changing the calendar to another year carries with it no promise – except perhaps our own optimism. But to those who wait for the Lord, the Scriptures promise that he will come. This last week of Advent, let us continue to wait. Place your desires, your hopes and longings in the bosom of Mary and wait with her in patience but also in expectation. And the one who is coming will come without delay.

It has been quite intense, behind the scenes for us at the Presbytery. The building is in a very bad shape (there was water pouring into Fr Jakub's room!) and we've just started on (and still identifying other) essential repairs but there is a lot more to do. We seem to have had a slow recovery from our Covid closure of the Church as a community. I daresay we have made some initial progress in starting to rebuild our parish community. But to be *the body of Christ*, we have much to do – and we all have to work together. Thank you for all your support, love and welcome, especially

to me as I've started as a new parish priest in this Church. There have been many who have worked quite hard in the background, both who are of the staple team at the Presbytery and many of our faithful volunteers. We also welcomed Grace as our new Parish Administrator among them. Thanks to the parishioners who have volunteered of their time to help us with odd tasks and those who even managed a social after the installation with Bishop Nicholas! We've started a few groups, and there's more to come (see below). If you have things, you would like done in the Church, do come and speak to us. Don't stay on the sidelines – please get involved! Let us entrust ourselves and everything we have to Our Lady, Mother of God to whom we are consecrated and under whose maternal love we will begin the New Year. If you're travelling may the angels accompany you, like they did the Holy Family to Bethlehem. And we hope you have a very wonderful Christmas break with your family or wherever you may be.
