Feast of the Presentation

This Friday, 2nd February, coming up this week is the feast of the Presentation of our Lord in the Temple. It marks the 40th day of Christmas. Just as Lent has forty days and Easter fifty days, there are forty days of the Christmas season as well. It is customary to remove the crib when the forty days are over. The reason for this feast marking the end of the Christmas season is Scriptural. In the gospel of Luke, the first section dealing with the Birth of Jesus, finishes with the Presentation in the Temple. Mary's presentation of Jesus is in line with the Mosaic Law that the first-born male child should be dedicated to the Lord on the fortieth day. It means that the child is offered up to God and no longer belongs to the parents. Normally the child would be 'redeemed', i.e. to say 'bought back' through the offering of a sacrifice. In his description of the event, Luke mentions the sacrifice but his writing implies that the child is dedicated and left behind in the Temple for the service of God. Jesus of course, goes back with Mary and Joseph, but from the beginning it is shown that his life is a simple offering to the Father. At the end of his life, he will be offered up once more, to the human race, by the Father for our salvation. The beauty and symbolism of the feast has also meant that it is a time when those who have been consecrated to the Religious life renew their vows. It is a good time to renew our own baptismal vows and offer of ourselves to the Father who gives up everything for us.

We will celebrate the Mass at 10 AM with candles lit and a procession from the door. After Mass, the crib will be removed – if there are people to give a hand after the morning Mass that will be very appreciated! Fr Rajiv's homily will be updated on <u>https://castingfire.wordpress.com</u>

Weddings: Those who wish to be married in the Catholic Church should ideally approach the priest of the parish where they live, at least six months before the proposed wedding date. There are formalities to be completed which are best given some time. If you are Catholic and not been Confirmed, at least in the UK, the Bishops Conference requires confirmation before the wedding. Again, for this to happen, it is best that you approach the priest a year in advance or at the earliest possible so preparations can be made towards Confirmation.
