Mark gives a powerful account of Jesus healing a leper in our gospel today. Lepers, then, as now in many places, remain a social pariah. Their disfigurement, and fears associated with the disease have caused them to be confined to the outskirts of society from the middle ages till today in some countries. Francis of Assisi was one of those repulsed by lepers. One day, on horseback, still on his journey of conversion, he encounters a leper in the field. In a moment, he decides. Rather than run, he gets down, approaches and kisses the leper. It would become a pivotal moment of healing for Francis. The next minute the leper had vanished in the open field causing Francis to realise that this leper was Christ. Who are the lepers in our life today? Maybe there are parts we hide as we struggle with acceptance. Jesus does not reject us. Come and be touched by Jesus. Receive his mercy and be healed. Following Mass on Mondays we will also have a short DVD Bible study on the Passion and Tuesdays we will have a half hour of Adoration immediately after Mass. The Passion is the core of the gospel stories. We might have heard it several times, from our childhood, but you will be surprised at the incredible depths of insight you will find when digging into the Scriptural background to this. It promises to change your living of Lent and your experience

of Christ's love for you, so do take advantage of this! Monday sessions will be no longer than an hour; we hope to see many of you there!
