Hosanna to the Son of David!

With this Sunday, the great week of Passover begins. Most people think of Christmas as the holiest time of the year, but in truth, it is this week, which the Church considers the most sacred. It is the most sacred, because it is this week in which our salvation was won. With Maundy Thursday, Lent finishes and Easter begins. Easter is a three-day festival. It is like a Mass in three parts, over three days - none of which are optional! It is unfortunate that in English we call this 'Easter' which comes more from a pagan festival rather than reflect its Jewish-Christian origins. The correct name for it is rather Passover or Pascha as it is called in most European languages. Passover is a verb, rather than a noun, like 'Easter'. It indicates movement, something happening. What is happening? We are passing over from death into life. This is not something symbolic. It is we who are passing over, not the Christians from two thousand years ago or Israel from even further afar. The Jews understood this event to be so real, it was as if each person around their Passover banquet were themselves being brought out of Egypt that year. We all need deliverance from Egypt. We need deliverance from the things and events that enslave us. Maybe with our best resolutions for Lent, all it has shown us is just how difficult, if not impossible it is for us to keep them. That we are enslaved by our fears, our needs for affirmation and approval, our worries about our future and money, our looks and health, our mobile phones, our constant restlessness, and our inability to give sufficient attention and love to those around us. Maybe we have discovered that we are poorer than we imagined in terms of our strength to conquer all. Then, rejoice! Christ comes to deliver

those who cannot deliver themselves, those who know they need saving. This Passover, Christ wants to take us with him into a new place of life and love, so we will be free to experience and enjoy the freedom of the sons and daughters of God. It is when we were set free from all that held us captive and given new life as children of God.

We are very blessed to have several catechumens being baptised at the Easter Vigil alongside those being received into the Church from other denominations and those being confirmed as adults. We bless God for this grace he works in the lives of people year after year. Come! Do not miss what God has in store for you. *The collection taken on Good Friday will be for the preservation of the places in the Holy Land.*
