FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Today we commence our season of Advent. Our Lord is the reason for the season, the reason for the season of Advent and the season for Christmas. In the hustle and bustle of getting everything prepared for Christmas, we remember that our Lord is the reason for Christmas. In all that we do in this In these four weeks of Advent we are given by the Church to prepare ourselves for Christmas. Yes, our entire lives, not just Advent, are a preparation and waiting in hope for God. Thus our Gospel asks us to prepare for the Lord's Second Coming and because we don't know when that will be, we can see our Gospel asking us to be ready to be called from this life whenever that will be, to be ready for our death. The Lord gives us advice and the first is, 'Watch yourselves, or your hearts will be coarsened with debauchery and drunkenness and the cares of life'

The Lord is reminding us to be aware of the temptations, attractions and the distractions in life that pulls us away from the real meaning of life, and it's our Lord himself who is the real meaning of life. There is no lasting happiness, only a temporary escape from today with its disappointments, responsibilities, in its 'debauchery and drunkenness' that our Lord refers to in the Gospel. So, for lasting peace and happiness we get our Lord's second advice. 'Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen, and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man'. The point here is, that our Lord asks us to pray. If however, we are too busy to pray then we are too busy. St Paul in our second reading advises us on how to use our time.

'we urge you and appeal to you in the Lord Jesus to make more and more progress in the kind of life that you are meant to live: the life that God wants'

These words of St Paul and from our Lord should lead me and you to ask, 'How do we spend our time?' I need to withdraw from what is a waste of time and instead to 'stay awake, praying at all times.' And to make substantial progress in the kind of life I am meant to live: The life that God wants.' The poem, which I include here, might help us to think about how we use our time.

I knelt to pray but not for long,/ I had too much to do,/ I had to hurry and get to work
For bills would soon be due./ So I knelt and said a hurried prayer,/ And jumped up off my knees.
My Christian duty was done/ My soul could rest at ease./ All day long I had no time /
To spread a word of cheer./ No time to speak of Christ to friends,/ They'd laugh at me I'd fear.
No time, no time, too much to do,/ That was my constant cry,/ No time to give to souls in need
But at last the time, the time to die./ I went before the Lord,/ I came; I stood with downcast eyes,
For in his hands God held a book;/ It was the book of life./ God looked into his book and said
'I waited for you each day/ I sent my Son Jesus for you/ But the time for Him you rarely found.'
(Sadly I don't know the source, and I have adapted it slightly).

To find time for our Lord we have the season of Advent. Advent is a time of grace given us by the Church to help us prepare our hearts for His coming. Let's not miss out on the grace God is willing to give us this Advent. Let us use the season of Advent to deepen our relationship with God and prepare our hearts for the celebration of Christmas. Let's remind ourselves there is only one gift at Christmas, and that gift is Jesus Christ our Lord.

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Advent Grace

Unless we have been shocked to our depths at ourselves and the things we are capable of, as well as at the failings of humanity as a whole, we cannot possibly understand the full import of Advent.

If the whole message of the coming of God, of the day of salvation, of approaching redemption, is to seem more than a divinely inspired legend or a bit of poetic fiction two things must be accepted unreservedly.

First, that life is both powerless and futile in so far as by itself it has neither purpose nor fulfillment. It is powerless and futile within its own range of existence and also as a consequence of sin. To this must be added the rider that life clearly demands both purpose and fulfillment.

Secondly, it must be recognised that it is God's alliance with humanity, his being on our side, ranging himself with us, that corrects this state of meaningless futility. It is necessary to be conscious of God's decision to enlarge the boundaries of his own supreme existence by condescending to share ours for the overcoming of sin.

All we have to rely on is the fact that these promises have been given and that they will be kept. God helps us to find ourselves and then to get away from ourselves, back to him.

He will ask you and me, whether we peered into our own hearts and discovered his appeal for our love and fidelity.

Heavenly Father, show us how to prepare our hearts for your Son's coming. This Advent may many soul's return in love of him.

Fun with Rosaries (Part Three)

Let's just say that you now have a nice rosary you really like and you want to learn how to use it. What next? The rosary is a practical experience, meaning there are no classes in how to say the rosary. There are also too many things on the internet that are unhelpful or confusing. You will certainly not learn what the rosary means to you through study.

My advice is to start simply. Just pick-up the rosary without thinking and say it out loud. Its good enough to begin with. People feel silly and self-conscious at first, which is why they say their prayers in their head. Prayers only become real when you say them out loud. You don't lose your place when you say a prayer, only when you just think them.

Start and finish with the sign of the cross. Just say the Our Fathers and the Hail Marys. Forget about the other prayers. Concentrate on each bead as you hold it and each word as you say it. Do this every day at the same time until you feel confident. Learn discipline. Don't let distractions delay or interrupt you or else you will soon give-up in frustration.

Be patient. When you are ready, begin each rosary with your own personal prayer. Say it to God, Jesus, Mary, or your favourite saint. Pray about something that troubles you, on behalf of someone else, in thanks for something good, or just because. Its your choice. Its a free space for you to grow in your faith about the things that matter to you personally.

When you feel ready, you should start saying the rosary before mass or confession, during the saturday Adoration, and maybe even instead of your evening prayers. This is also the time when you should introduce the other prayers into your rosary: the Apostle's Creed, Glory Be, Fatima Prayer, and Hail Holy Queen. You will find the rosary takes less time than you think.

Saying the rosary is much more fun in company. Catholics most often say their prayers together. We sometimes forget what to say when there is no-one to say it with. So say your rosary with a friend or loved-one at home. Be brave. Ask someone politely that you are on nodding terms with in church if you can join them in their rosary. Its ok if they say no.

The Parish also has a Rosary Group that meets on the first sunday of the month after the 11am mass. You don't have to join. There are plenty of people that say the rosary all the time in church who are not part of the Rosary Group and that's fine. It really only matters that saying the rosary makes your your faith grow and your life better.

If I was to offer any advice to a new Catholic, it would be to buy a rosary and use it today. Practical experience is the only way we truly learn, after all.
