God's Tenants

The reality I suppose for us Christians is to strive towards that fulness of faith which we only have through the sacraments in this life. What then are the implications? that loyalty to Jesus which is the *sine qua non* of eternal life.

Does it mean the slightest devaluation of this life, in particular, the daily tasks which impose upon us? Nothing could be further from the truth, we will be judged, not by our ability to escape from the human responsibilities, but according to the fresh meaning we discover in them and the renewed devotion we discharged them. We are aware aren't we, that eternal life were it independent of this life, then the latter would become worthless and unimportant. But this isn't the case; we know no other life but the one we prepare for, during the course of this, life. Such a view of eternal life does not nullify the current life but gives it infinite value. If this present life were to stop tomorrow, with no hope of after-life, it wouldn't have the importance conferred on every minute by the Christian prospect, not only of eternity but of eternal judgment and resurrection.

Without a doubt, for us Christians, everything hinges on the imminence of Jesus' return. Thus, we are called to live every moment with a lively consciousness that our Lord Jesus might call us the very next moment to appear before him and be judged for eternity according to what he or she has done with their life up to then. Every minute of every hour the whole Church repeats: 'Come, Lord Jesus! Come!' the Church is ever ready to welcome him. What does it mean? simply put it means every Christian must practice perfect charity. It also means that the Christian must try to live in that love shown to him by God, the love which is the love of God. The love, charity, and the gospels are creative love, a love that gives and gives itself. This is the sort of life the Christian must lead in this world having participated in the Eucharistic banquet. The sacramental world is a link between to other worlds, the world of eternity, in which the risen Saviour lives, and the world here and now, in which we have to live and attain in ourselves the life the Risen One.

Grant this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who shared our weakness in all things but sin, and lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit forever and ever. Amen

Heavenly Father, Since your mercy has been revealed in the tenderness of your Son Jesus Christ, who said to his disciples: 'Let the little children come to me', we pray that your Church may be a secure home where all children and vulnerable adults are brought closer to your Beloved Son.

May all those who have been abused physically, emotionally, and sexually by your ministers, be respected and accompanied by tangible gestures of justice and reparation so that they may feel healed with the balm of your compassion.
