On the Season of Advent

The present season is one of particular importance. It is a sacred season. As the Holy Spirit says; it is a time of Lord's favour, the day of salvation, peace, and reconciliation. The patriarchs and prophets longed and prayed and yearned with all their hearts for this time. That just man Simeon at long last saw this time and his joy was boundless. And the Church has always kept this season in a special way. So, we too must continue to celebrate it fittingly, giving praise and thanks to the eternal Father for the mercy he has shown us in this mystery of the coming of his Only-begotten Son.

The Father sent his Son out of his immeasurable love for us sinners. He sent him to free us from the tyrannical power of the devil, to invite us to heaven, and lead us into its innermost sanctuary. He was sent to show us truth itself, to teach us how we should live, to share with us the source of all goodness, to enrich us with the treasures of his grace. Finally, he was sent to make us sons of the Father and heirs to eternal life.

The Church calls this mystery to mind each year to stir us to renew constantly our memory of the great love God has shown us. This commemoration teaches us that our Saviour came not only for the benefit of the people of his own time. His goodness is still there for us to share in. But, for our part, through faith and the sacraments, we must lay hold on the grace he won for us and live by its obedience to him.

The Church wants us to understand that as he came once into the world in the flesh, so now, if we remove all barriers, he is ready to come to us again at any minute or hour, to make his home spiritually within us in all his grace.

Like a devoted mother, keenly concerned for our salvation, the Church uses the rites of this season, its hymns, songs, and other utterances of the Holy Spirit to teach us a lesson. She knows us how to receive this great gift of God with thankfulness and how to be enriched by its possession. She teaches that our hearts should be as prepared now for the coming of Christ our Lord as if he were still to come into the world. The Fathers also have taught us the same lesson, giving us words and examples from the Old Testament to imitate.

Forgive our Sins

Advent reminds me of my sinfulness and my need for forgiveness. especially, when I look back at the year. Those times that I offended my Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. I have to call out my sins and of mankind. This year in particular we had to deal with COVID and the uncertainties it brought. I suffered from it but I was spared the hospital by God's good grace. Others have succumbed to it and passed away, leaving an empty void for those that were left behind.

Our Liturgy, speaks not of despair but of hope. Despite all that is happening around us-we are certain that God will come to save us. He is ever running towards his sinful creation to wipe away our tears, and to banish our guilt, offering to us his forgiving love. One may say, yes, we are aware of our miseries. Are we? more often we confuse sin with self-disgust, self-disillusionment which you and I suffer from. I might say, that we have an image of what we are like or want to be like and feel that we have fallen short and feel embarrassed and even lose face in the presence of others. The bottom line is that we wail about our human poverty, which we would like our Lord to remove from us. It seems we tend to focus on this than on the sin, while we are so pre-occupied, fighting against it, we cannot see where the real sin is. We need to cultivate awareness of our sinfulness which is part of holiness. Sure, we all want to be holy and we cannot have it unless we acknowledge the sin, it's the effect of God's closeness; could this be the reason that true sorrow for sin is never morbid, depressed. It carries the certainty of forgiveness.

Loving Lord, come and enlighten us this Advent. Show us, the sloth, pride, our running away from the demands of life, our constant evasions. Reveal our true sinfulness in the light of your mercy, for then Lord we shall be healed and then come to know the true joy.

You have received many things, and you let your brother, your sister die of hunger?" Pope Francis
