St Joseph

As announced by Our Holy Father, Pope Francis has declared a year of St Joseph commencing from 8th December 2020 - 8th December 21.

We are invited by Holy Father to Pray to St Joseph and to help us during the Year here are some quotes: 'With the exception of our loving Mother, St Joseph stands above all the saints' St. Maximilian Kolbe

'The Almighty has concentrated in St Joseph, as in a Sun of unrivalled luster, the combined light, and splendour of all the other saints' St Gregory Nazianzen

Though not his [Jesus'] father by generation, he [St Joseph] was his father in his upbringing, his care, and the affection of his heart. It seems to me, therefore, that Joseph is clearly the holiest of all the saints, holier than the patriarchs, than the prophets than the apostles, than all the other saints. The objection cannot be raised that the Lord said of John the Baptist: *Among those born of women, there has been none greater than John the Baptist [LK 7:28, Mt 11: 11]*. Just as this cannot be understood to mean that John is even holier than Christ or the Blessed Virgin, so it can't be understood in reference to blessed Joseph, the spouse of the Virgin Mary and the father of Christ, for just as husband and wife are one in flesh, so too Joseph and Mary were one in heart, one in soul, one in spirit. And as in that first marriage, God created Eve to be like Adam, so in the second marriage he made Joseph to be like the Blessed Virgin in holiness and justice' St Lawrence of Brindisi.

'Who is not aware that, after the Blessed Mother, St Joseph is of all the saints, the one who is the dearest to God?' St Alphonsus Liguori

I hope the above quotes, would encourage you to pray to St Joseph whom I fondly regard as my spiritual father. St Joseph pray for us.

'What do you want?'

These are the first words Jesus speaks at the beginning of his ministry. One could say, these are important words Jesus asks of each one of us. All our searching could be expressed, 'What do you want?' The gospel of John is the answer to that question. But the answer, as all of us discover, is not a 'What' but a 'Who'? when Jesus answers the two disciples he says, 'come and see' he does not give a program or some kind of a policy. It is by spending some time with Jesus, that we are persuaded to follow him. It is by encountering Jesus as the Samaritan woman, the man born blind, and Nicodemus they did just that they encountered him and we need to do that too. When John uses a parable, it is all about Jesus-the true vine, the Good Shepherd, and the 'I am'; sayings underline this. For John, faith is not some philosophy or a moral code or affirmations, but a personal encounter with Jesus. In our First reading Samuel didn't know the Lord, so Eli had to guide him. Eli equally, knew that when God calls there is only one answer, 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening'. The reason Christianity emphasises the importance of prayer in all its forms is not that it gives answers or achieves success or solves difficult problems, instead, it enables the one who prays to spend time with Jesus. Once Andrew comes to know Jesus his first reaction is to take others to Jesus. Evangelisation is simply introducing others to Jesus with whom one has met and spent time with him. *Fr. Christopher*

Dear Friends in Christ,

What has brought us encouragement has been taken away. Sometimes, even more, when someone we know has been lost to COVID or has made recovery and yet struggling with long COVID.

We are in the first week of ordinary time. The daily Gospel readings from Mark. He introduces the Lord's ministry calling us to repentance. It becomes a personal invitation. It's calling you and me to turn again to the Lord to work afresh in his service.

We are told how Jesus went to some lonely place to pray and we don't need to look for that place. He is here in the Tabernacle in our Church and in our hearts. By visiting the Church spending some time in prayer we can be in his presence. A great blessing.

With this pandemic which is at our doorstep as it were. It has taken over our lives. But the Lord calls us to fear not and to place our trust in him. We know what to do, the uncertainty and fear still remain.

How do I address these concerns? Jesus' ministry begins with healing from the diabolical, sickness, and with forgiveness of sins. His presence which we all desire, 'Come Lord Jesus'

Despite the desolation, the isolation I feel at times in my ministry to you and to others. I bring it to the Lord, who alone can calm and restore. Only he can infuse fresh energy, love and he alone can heal and strengthen.

This latest lockdown bears heavily than the first. The newness of the challenge it seems has gone. I thank you all, for encouraging me, which enables me to support you. Thank you also to all those who carry out the tasks here in the Church which sustains me in the ministry here and enabling the church to stay open.

I encourage you to take the vaccine when it is offered to you, which might bring calm. Let's not forget, that coming to the Lord is the first and greatest good.

Finally, permit me to quote from the Collect, 'Attend to the pleas of your people with heavenly care, O Lord, we pray that we may see what must be done and gain strength to do what we have seen. We ask this through Christ our Lord' Amen *Fr. Christopher*
