OF LENT**Yes, God loved the world so much.**

It was never God's intention to condemn, nor does he force us to be saved. We are created with the freedom to choose. This means we can make bad choices as well as good. Let's look at the last twenty-four hours, what choices did we make were they good or bad?

The gospel emphasises the importance of faith and is most reassuring. All of us who believe in Jesus, who died and rose from the dead for us, have eternal life. God sent his only Son into the world, not to condemn it but that it might be saved, Jesus the key to salvation. All the blessings we long for are contained in Christ. We are prone to error and sin. The mercy and goodness of Jesus towards us will rescue us. To believe in Jesus is light- light that illumines around us, and sadly we prefer the darkness-due to our sinfulness. When we are consumed by our sins, we don't want the brightness of faith, which shows up our wrongdoing. God loved the world so much-It is my faith, and it sometimes challenging when there are floods, earthquakes, famine, droughts that have a huge impact on the poor. yet I see the figure of Jesus, lifted on the Cross, a devastating failure, and he offered himself in love for us.

'Yes, God loved the world so much, that he gave his only Son'. It has been said, that if all of the Scriptures were lost except for these thirteen words, we would have enough to give us hope. God our Father, I thank you for this statement of your love for us. Jesus is the light of the world. He enlightens us, oftentimes in mysterious ways that others might not understand. An early Church writer said: 'Sinners, deprived of the light, worship in the dark'. I like that! Lord, let me live in the light that streams from you. This divine light is in us, often called the light of God. Prayer is the time we 'switch on' this light, and allow ourselves to become aware of the light of God filling us with love, forgiveness, and healing. The light of God in each of us spreads to others and it's through God's people that God's light shines in the world. Prayer then gives us a consciousness of that light., received and given.

For God So Loved the World

Christian Faith is centred on Christ; it is the confession that Jesus is Lord and that God has raised him from the dead. All the threads of the Old Testament converge on Christ; he becomes the definitive Yes to all the promises, the ultimate basis of our *Amen* to God. If Israel continued to recall God's great acts of love, which formed the core of its confession of faith and broadened its gaze in faith, the life of Jesus now appears as the locus of God's definitive intervention, the supreme manifestation of his love for us. The Word which God speaks to us in Jesus is not simply one word among many, but his eternal Word. God can give no greater guarantee of his love, Christian faith is thus faith in a perfect love, in its decisive power, in its ability to transform the world and to unfold its history. *We ourselves have known and put our faith in God's love towards ourselves* (1Jn 4:16). In the love of God revealed in Jesus, faith perceives the foundation on which all reality and its final destiny rest.

The clearest proof of the reliability of Christ's love is to be found in his dying for our sake. If laying down one's life for one's friends is the greatest proof of love, Jesus offered his own life for all, even for his enemies, to transform their hearts. This explains why the evangelists could see the hour of Christ's crucifixion as the culmination of the gaze of faith; in that hour the depth and breadth of God's love shone forth. It was then that Saint John offered his solemn testimony, as together with the Mother of Jesus he gazed upon the pierced one: *This is the evidence of one who saw it-trustworthy evidence and he knows he speaks the truth-*(Jn 19:35).

In Dostoevsky's *The Idiot*, Prince Myshkin sees a painting by Hans Holbein the Younger depicting Christ dead in the tomb and says; 'Looking at that painting might cause one to lose faith'. The painting is a gruesome portrayal of the destructive effects of death on Christ's body. Yet it is precisely in contemplating Jesus' death the faith grows stronger and receives a dazzling light; then it is revealed as faith in Christ's steadfast love for us, a love capable of embracing death to bring us salvation. This love, which did not recoil before death in order to show its depth, is something I can believe in; Christ's total self-gift overcomes every suspicion and enables me to entrust myself to him completely.
