OF LENT**John 12: 20-30**

Jeremiah, says that God would make a new covenant unlike the one made with stone tablets that Moses received on mount Sani, which they broke. So, God will act definitively and give a New Covenant- this New Covenant will be written directly into the heart-the very essence of a person. This initiative of God will be accompanied by the forgiveness of our sins. This New Covenant is what God has done in Jesus- as we record in the words of consecration every time, we celebrate the Eucharist.

In the Gospel, we see some Greeks making a request, 'Sir, we should like to see Jesus' is a continuous theme of a personal encounter with Jesus that occurs throughout the Gospel, but since they are pagans direct us to the promise of Jesus, that when he is lifted up, 'I shall draw all men to myself. 'Now the hour has come' is preparing the disciples for what is to come. The request to be saved from the hour is similar to the Synoptic, tradition, and the presence of an angelic voice, the consoling angel at the 'agony in the garden' In John, however, Jesus goes to his passion, not as a helpless victim but as one who takes on the task he has been given by the Father. John's account of the Passion does not in any way downplay the humanity of Jesus but presents us with one who is aware that the cross is the way to glorification.

In every death, there is life-this is the message of Lent and Easter. The grain of wheat that dies will nourish us with food. In the death of relationships, of health, of faith, and all that may be dear to us there is always the invitation to a deeper life. In our hour of death is the call to everlasting life. *Fr. Christopher*

Recently I wrote to our Member of Parliament Apsana Begum MP on the New Genocide Amendment to the Trade Bill tabled by Lord Alton of Liverpool. I share her response with you. Thanks

Dear Christopher,

Thank you for writing to me about the New Genocide Amendment to the Trade Bill tabled by Lord Alton of Liverpool.

As you will know, following almost five decades of trade policy decided at European level, the Trade Bill represents a transfer of authority from the EU to the UK – providing the foundation and legal framework for the UK's post-Brexit trade deals.

During the Bill's passage through Parliament, I have supported a number of amendments covering a wide range of issues including parliamentary scrutiny, protecting the NHS and regulatory standards.

Lord Alton's amendment lays out that "International bilateral trade agreements are revoked if the High Court of England and Wales makes a preliminary determination that they should be revoked on the ground that another signatory to the relevant agreement represents a state which has committed genocide under Article II of the United Nations Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide".

a longstanding supporter of human rights and agree with you that the UK Government should be doing much more to support people around the world who are defending human rights. I have continued to be concerned at the Government's approach to human rights internationally and at the decision to not make human rights requirements an integral part of the UK's trade strategy, in particular. As one example, the Government signed an agreement with the Egyptian Government in December 2020 to "strengthen political and trade ties between the two countries". This agreement did not address the widely noted human rights abuses in Egypt where political opponents of the Government are summarily jailed and executed and that LGBT people are persecuted.

with groups like Amnesty International, important work speaking up for human rights defenders and campaigns is done in the UK by the trade union movement. As one example of this the Trade Union Congress (TUC) has recently called on the UK Government to use its leverage in trade negotiations with Turkey to ensure that the Turkish Government respects labour and human rights. I support campaigns such as these that seek to put pressure on the UK Government to change course on human rights. I stood on a manifesto that recognised that "around the world, human rights defenders and civil society activists remain vulnerable to attacks" and called for "reform of the international rules-based order to secure justice and accountability for breaches of human rights and international law". I stand by those commitments.

Since its conception, the Trade Bill has inspired concern amongst civil society and parliamentarians for what is argued to be its "scrutiny deficit." The Bill has limited provisions for Parliamentary oversight of the negotiation, implementation or ratification of any future trade deals. Given the potential economic and policy implications of future trade deals, many argue that the Bill should guarantee Parliament a direct vote on any future deals before they are ratified, comparing the situation to the US, Japan and the EU, where the legislative bodies all have a final vote on the ratification of trade deals. David Lawrence, Senior Political Adviser at the Trade Justice Movement argued the UK "lags far behind" other countries when it comes to scrutiny of trade agreements. I assure you that I will continue to do everything I can in Parliament and beyond to advocate for a transparent, accountable and progressive approach to trade that protects and upholds human rights.
