### 'God's mercy reaches all, and the whole world is saved'

We, Though many, are one body and members one of another, as scripture says, for Christ has linked us together with the chains of love. For he has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing wall of hostility, by abolishing the law of commandments and ordinances. We ought then all to have the same care for one another, and if one member suffers, all the members suffer together; if one member is honoured, all the members rejoice.

'So welcome one another', says St Paul, 'as Christ welcomed you, for the glory of God'. We shall welcome one another if we choose to care for one another, to bear one another's burdens, and to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. It was in this way that God welcomed us in Christ. For St John truly said that the world was loved so much by God the Father that the Son himself was given for our sake. He was given in exchange for the lives of all of us; and so we escaped from death and were redeemed form death and sin. Saint Paul explains the working of the redemption when he says that Christ became a servant of the circumcision for the sake of God's truthfulness. For just as God had promised to the Jewish patriarchs that he would bless their posterity and make it like the stars of heaven in number, so too he appeared in human nature and became man, though he was God the Word, who preserves all creation in existence and , being God, confers on all creatures their state of well-being. He came into the world endowed with human nature, not, however, 'to be served but to serve', as he said, 'and to give his life as a ransom for many'.

He claims to have come in visible form in order to fulfil the promise made to Israel: 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel'. Paul speaks the truth, then, when he declares that Christ became a servant to the circumcision in order to confirm the promises given to the patriarchs, and that he was sent by his divine Father for this purpose and to fulfil God's mercy to the Gentiles, so that they too might glorify the Saviour and Redeemer as the creator and architect of the universe. In this way, once the mercy which comes from heaven reached out to all men, the Gentiles were included in it; the mystery of the wisdom contained in Christ can be seen to have achieved its merciful plan. For in place of those who had fallen the whole world is saved through the mercy of God.

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**BAPTISM** Baptisms here at St Edmunds usually take place during one of the Masses. However, due to the pandemic and easing of restrictions, Baptisms will continue to take place outside of Mass on a Saturday morning. The date and time have to be booked with the Parish Secretary and confirmed in writing by her.

Prior to the Baptism parents are required to come to see me and attend a Baptism course. These courses are run by the parish a few times a year according to need and are announced on the last page in the Newsletter.

You can attend the course by registering with Katherine at the Parish office and will contact you when the course would commence. The course can be done at any time after the mother knows that she is pregnant.

Both parents are required to attend the course—even if one is not a Catholic. This is not an attempt to convert the non-Catholic! It is that both parents are requesting Baptism and both are involved in bringing up their child as a Catholic. The non-Catholic parent might have issues that He/she must face up to. For example, the child will be told it's essential to go to Mass on Sundays; If one parent is not a Catholic, is not going to Mass, this might confuse the child thinking that her or his parents are not going to heaven. Without compromising the parent's non-Catholicity, the parent should work out a way of settling the child without undermining the child's faith.

If however, a non-Catholic parent is refusing to be involved with the request for baptism and is not cooperating with the promise to bring the child up as a Catholic, the Parish needs to be informed before any commitment to provide baptism can be entered into. Do bear in mind that it's a requirement of Canon Law that we are satisfied the conditions for baptism exist before we agree to baptise.

Requests are often made for permission for the baptism to be conducted elsewhere. In principle, I am willing to grant permission - subject to parents undergoing the same process they would have gone through were the baptism to take place here. Having the baptism celebrated elsewhere cannot be used as means of evading the preparation process.
